FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFTY-NINE cars of freight were reported inwards and outwards at the Halifax terminus last week.

MR. W. T. LAWSON, who has for the past nine years represented in this Province the firm of T. & E. Kenny, London and Halifax, left this morning for Halifax. Mr. Lawson, we understand, goes to London in the interest of the firm with which he has so successfully represented here. We wish him every success in his new sphere. Mr. L. will be succeeded by Mr. R. F. Irving, of this city.

A DESPATCH from Bimlipatani of June 28th, says the barque Minnie Carmichael, Taylor, now loading at Vizagapatam, has broken her windlass and she cannot get it repaired there. The master thinks of proceeding with the vessel to Cocanada and having the windlass repaired there, slipping his anchor and chain at Vizagapatam, but he has telegraphed to his agents at Liverpool for instructions.

THE way in which "our Islanders abroad" press toward the front is well illustrated by the rapid advancement of Mr. Angus Gregor, late of New Glasgow. Three months ago he went to work in the car-shops of the Canada Pacific Railway Company, at Winnipeg, knowing nothing about the distinctive work of car-building; and he is now foreman of all the carpenters employed there. Mr. Gregor was widely known here as a skilful mechanic; and we are glad to know that his talents have been so speedily recognized in the Great West.

THE main cabin of the steamer "Beaver" (which plys between ports in the Lower Provinces and Magdalen Islands) has been well fitted up, and is now ready to accommodate passengers. On Monday next the steamer will extend her voyage to Gaspe. This will afford a good opportunity for parties wishing to spend a few days in the Magdalen Islands. The captain and crew of the "Beaver" are very obliging, and every attention is given to the comfort and convenience of passengers.

AFTER all expenses were paid, connected with the Conventions held last week, the ten cents admission fee, &c., afforded a small balance, which will be deposited in the Savings Bank towards furnishing the Reformatory, after it is established in Charlottetown. The Committee acknowledges with thanks two donations, of \$6 each, from the Patriot Office and the EXAMINER Co., and a donation from a friend. The thanks of the Committee are due the Rev. K. MacLennan and the Hon. Colonel Gray for their kind assistance during the past few weeks.

LAST week an eagle was captured in a barn at Lower Bedouque. In the morning, when the folks came out, the bird was in the barn-yard which was enclosed by a high board fence. On being pursued, it went into the barn the door of which was open, and was there captured. Its spread of wing is said to be about seven feet. A similar bird was shot in the same neighborhood several weeks ago and is thought to be the mate of that captured last week. The sportsman (an Indian) instead of disposing the bird to some one who would have it stuffed, cut off the wings and claws and threw the remainder away.—Pioneer.

THE steamer M. A. Starr due here this morning at 6 o'clock, has not yet arrived.

THE Cheese Factory at Cornwall is now in full blast, and is turning out a large quantity of first-class quality of cheese, which will, it is thought, find a ready market at home and abroad. Mr. Newberry is to be complimented on the success of the enterprise.

FARMERS from all parts of the country agree that this season's was the best made hay crop for many years. True, it was not so heavy as last year, but the fine weather enabled our farmers to garner a much more valuable crop. Those who want the best quality of hay in Canada will have to come to the tight little Island.

THE potato bugs which were brought to this city on Tuesday, by Mr. John Binns, of New Glasgow, are on exhibition at the Apothecaries' Hall and are attracting a great deal of attention. Some of those who inspect them bring news of the ravages of the insect in other parts of the Province. One gentleman, from Cardigan, states that myriads of the pests lit in that district a few days ago, and are likely to do serious damage. Similar reports come from Tryon, Crapaud and other parts. A curious circumstance in connection with the invasion of the insects is that they will not feed on any but the most luxuriant vines. The vine of the Early Rose is preferable, and when they have thoroughly destroyed this, they attack the vines of tubers which are not so well flavored.

THE four-oared shell boat, owned by the Davies-Robins Crew, has been sold by Mr. Thomas Robins, of this city, to Mr. Thomas Ormand, of Halifax, who represented the Williams Crew here at the regatta last fall. This boat was built for the aforesaid crew by Mr. Logan, boat builder of St. John, and is pronounced by competent judges to be one of the best boats ever built in the Maritime Provinces. She was rowed in two professional races on the Hillsborough last fall, and scored second in the race in competition with first-class crews from Halifax, and first in a match race with the Lavers-Hinch crew. It is a pity that the crew which have been successful in this boat are not here at the present time. If they were, there is no doubt they would compete and take a leading part at the Regatta at Halifax next month.
