HOW TO GET MOST OUT OF THE COW.

Jos. Gould, of Uxbridge, Gives Points on Care and Feeding.

PRACTICAL TALK BY A PRACTICAL MAN.

Regularity and Gentleness Two Prime Requisites—Be Prepared to Feed All Year Round.

RETURN PER COW.

"How many pounds of milk do you get per cow?" asked another.

"That depends on the cow and the period she has been milking," replied the speaker. "I have two fresh cows which are giving 19 and 17 lbs respectively at each milking. My average is about 10 lbs for each milking. My cows are not Holsteins but Jerseys. If they were Holsteins I would get more milk, but I would not get 4 and 5 per cent butter fat.

"Do you think Holsteins are as profitable as Jerseys?" came from one of the dairymen.

"I have had no personal experience in the matter," replied Mr. Gould, "but from what I have read I do not think that they are."

"Would not a Holstein eat more than a Jersey?" queried another listener.

"They will eat twice as much," said Mr. Gould. "When Calamity Jane, the big Holstein milker, was shown at the dairy test at Guelph, she ate about 14 lbs per day in silage meal, etc."

"Then," said R. C. Brandon, "for a thousand pound cow you propose giving about 40 lbs silage, 4 pounds clover and 4 lbs sugar beet per diem?"

"Yes," answered Mr. Gould, "and as much straw as the animal will take. My practice is to mix the silage and other ingredients, with the exception of bran, and allow it to stand for 24 hours. After standing that time the straw is as tender as the silage itself. I add the meal at the time of feeding, because some cows need more meal than others. There is, however, no arbitrary rule as to the amount to feed. Each man must study each individual cow in his herd for himself. Just so long as response comes to the milk pail keep on increasing the feed until you reach the maximum."

"Last spring," said Thos. Russell, formerly of Mariposa, "I fed bran for a month for the first time. I never had such a flow before as I had while feeding of this bran."

RESPECTIVE VALUE OF HAY AND STRAW.

"What value do you put on well saved straw?" asked Mr. Brandon. "Good oat straw," replied Mr. Gould, "is of more value than the best timothy. One ton clover is, for the use of milkers, worth three tons of timothy."

"What would you feed to increase the percentage of butter fat?" asked one of those present.

"You can't increase the percentage of fat," replied Mr. Gould. "I would like," put in Manager Sproule, of the Cannington creamery, "to have that point emphasized. Some of our patrons think it can be done and when they do not get an increased percentage of fat in return from feeding bran they grow discouraged."

"Well," said Mr. Gould in reply to this request. "One of the experimenters in connection with one of the agricultural colleges in the States dealt with this very matter. He took an old plug of a cow from the street, one that was giving about six pounds of milk per day. He fed that cow until her flow was increased to twenty-four pounds and still the percentage of butter fat remained practically the same. The development of the cow fixes the amount of butter fat you will receive per pound of milk. This is proved by my own experience. Tests of my cows show practically the same percentage of butter fat all

the year round, save that when the cows are about drying up they will show a little higher percentage than when they are in fresh milk. Indeed, at the end of the first six weeks, the percentage is higher than it is at first."

"Will cattle eat ensilage after they have been on fresh grass?" asked J. C. Sproule.

"Yes," answered Mr. Gould, "I have seen cattle, when you would think they were so full they could not eat any more, still take four or five pounds of ensilage when the same was offered them."

VALUE OF DIFFERENT FOODS.

"Do you put more value on bran than you do on oats?" asked Mr. Sproule again.

"Yes," was the answer, "I put more value on bran than I do on peas even."

"We find," said Mr. Sproule, "that oats are of more value for pigs with litters than any other food. They seem to give a greater milk flow than is secured in any other way."

"I cannot account for that," said Mr. Gould, "in any other way than that the pig and the cow are different animals."
