RACES AT ST. STEPHEN

A Plucky Horse and Driver.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 13. The horse races at St. Stephen yesterday were well attended. The three-minute class was won by Arclight, St. John, with Jubilee, Yarmouth, second, and Kitty D., Houlton, third. In the 2.27 class Sea King, of Yarmouth had two firsts, two seconds, and a fourth. Rocket also has two heats unfinished, on account of darkness. PROHIBITION!

Views of Mayor of Montreal.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13. Mayor McShane gave evidence before the Commission on prohibition yesterday. He held that Montreal was no worse than other places as regards the liquor question, and that prohibition would not improve matters. He believed, with Father McCallan, that abuse and not use of God's gifts constitutes sin. If a man wanted to drink liquor he had a right to take it, but a man who was inclined to take a drop too much should join a temperance society.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13. Mrs. Fee, while attempting to save a little boy from being run over by a Grand Trunk train, was crushed to death at Point St. Charles. General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Public attention was again drawn to the case of the owners and captain of the ship Aladdin against the mate and 18 of the crew who refused to go with the ship even as far as Cuxhaven, she being ready to sail from Falmouth for Hamburg. The Falmouth magistrate, before whom the rebellious seamen were arraigned yesterday, adjourned the case to ascertain whether Cuxhaven was infected with cholera. To-day he received a telegram stating that Cuxhaven had not been declared an infected port, though cholera cases had occurred there. He thereupon gave decision in favor of the Aladdin's crew, a decision which was loudly cheered by those in the crowded court room. The ship's owners have declared their intention to appeal.
