The Mysterious Yeast In Dough-Raising Role

COFFEE cakes raised with yeast are favorite foods in almost all wheat-growing countries. But because of the time involved in making, they are seldom baked at home. Instead, they are bought ready-baked (or frozen) from a bakery or supermarket. If of really good quality, and mixed enough to serve on a second day, they are generally in the expensive class.

In our test kitchen, the group of yeast cakes raised with baking powder, they are easy to do, pleasantly moist, reasonable in price, delectable to the last bite.

The following heads the group:

COFFEE CAKE
1 1/2 c. sifted flour
1/2 tsp. double-acting baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. ground mace or nutmeg
1/2 c. sugar
1/4 c. shortening
1 egg, beaten
2 1/2 c. milk
1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
4 medium size raisins, tart cookie apples
1 tsp. fresh lemon juice
3 tsp. sugar

THE CHEF'S PLENTIFUL BUDGET-WISE FISH REPORT
Cauterizing, broiling, frying, plenty of budget fish and seafood in various forms: Fresh fish, including salmon, trout, filets, steaks, fish sticks and scallops, all over the country; plentiful sardines; canned tuna in large supply; canned crabmeat are everywhere.

BAKED STRIPED BASS PLATTER
Use 3 lb. cleaned bass, shad, white, mackerel, bluefish or 1 1/2 lb. fish steaks or filets.
Heat good sized, heat-resistant baking platter. Grease and salt. Rub with oil. Season fish with salt, pepper and 1 tsp. monosodium glutamate. Center on platter.
Smoke fish in moderate oven 25 minutes. Broil with twice with 1/4 c. melted butter or margarine.
Broiler fish with Duchesne potato (often colcannon). In addition, make potato border an inch from edge of platter. Return to oven for 8 min. to finish cooking and brown.
Have ready assembly of hot colorful vegetables to fill space between two potato borders. Top fish with smaller slices of lemon and maitre d'hotel butter. Garnish: parsley.
