From the activity in increasing the capacity of New England woolen mills, a heavy demand is expected. At East Dorer, Me., the mills are running at night, at Gray on extra time, and at Pawtucket large additions are being made.

The surplus revenue of the United States for the last fiscal year was \$102,864,704, and it was only nine millions less in the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1885.
