A new refrigeration car and a new type of heated car will be put in operation for the first time in Prince Edward Island today by the Canadian National Railways. Refrigerator car CN 21000 is mechanically operated. It derives its necessary power from a 34 HP diesel engine generator suspended beneath the car.

A.C.W.W. Conference Will Be In Canada For First Time

Rural women from all over the world will meet in Canada this summer when the Associated Country Women of the World holds its seventh triennial conference at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, August 12-23, and already the hostess groups, the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada and Les Cercles de Fermieres, are making preparations for hospitality and entertainment for the guests.

It is expected that nearly 1,000 delegates and visitors from at least 26 different countries will attend. This will be the first time the A.C.W.W. has met in Canada, but the founder and first president was a Canadian, the late Mrs. Alfred Watt, who also introduced the Women's Institute idea in Great Britain from Canada.

At the present time 2800 people are drawing Unemployment Insurance Benefits in this province. Of these 1700 are being paid through the National Employment Office in Charlottetown, and eleven hundred by the Summerside office. More than 60% of the claimants are residents of rural districts. The total amount paid weekly is roughly estimated to be close to \$50,000.

Lenten Meditation From The Columns of The Times, London THE SPIRIT OF TRUTH

It is not uncommon to hear it said that it is absurd to look to the New Testament for guidance in the solution of contemporary problems, political, economic or even ethical.

Now is it only with regard to the past that this is true? "He will show you things to come. All things that the Father hath are mine; therefore said I, that he shall take of mine and shall show it unto you."

What is needed is the experience of God in action, quickening men's understanding of contemporary events, rousing them out of contentment with established ways and accepted solutions, and doing this by driving them to think through their apprehension of the mind of Christ to the point at which it speaks to man's present need.

When he, the Spirit of Truth is come, he will guide you into all truth... he will show you things to come. He shall glorify me: for he shall receive of mine, and shall show it unto you.

Those words may, or may not, be the ipsissima verba of Jesus. What they unmistakably are is the record of an experience the reality of which had been established beyond all doubt.
