

U. S. Election & Tariffs

In general, Canadian interest in United States' elections is concerned chiefly with the effect that victory for either party might have on American trade with foreign countries.

Doubtless, the chief reason for this tradition-breaking development, as it involves the Republicans, is that President Eisenhower always has been committed in a more or less energetic way to the liberalization of tariffs to the greatest possible extent commensurate with the national interest.

The Democratic platform stresses the same two points, but in reverse order. "Under Democratic administrations", it reads, "the operation of the Reciprocal Trade Act was conducted in a manner that recognized equities for agriculture, industry and labor."

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New Vaccine

With so many big events competing for the headlines of publicity in recent weeks, an announcement by the United States Public Health Service has not received as much attention as it deserved in view of its potential importance to human welfare.

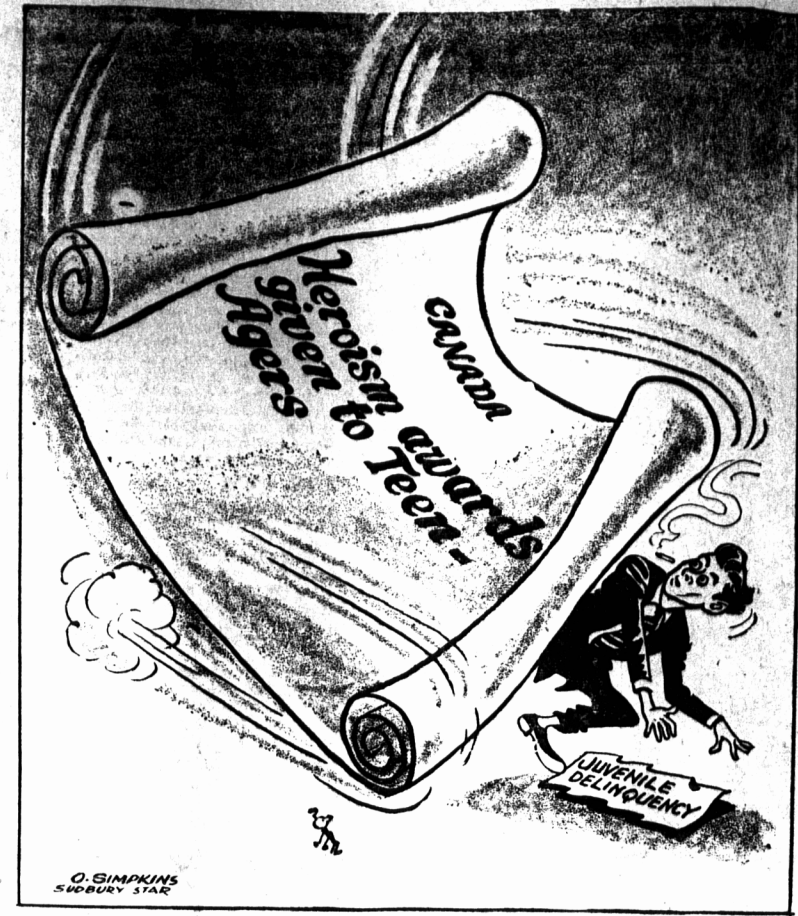

Eisenhower's Renomination

By nominating President Eisenhower for a second term, the Republicans have put their trust in him to do what no other man has done—complete eight years in the White House at the age of 70.

Why did Eisenhower decide to seek re-election at his age, now 65, to perhaps the toughest job in the world after two major illnesses—the one of which kept him in hospital for seven weeks, the other for three?

Two of his public statements of the last few months shed some light. Last Feb. 29, a bit more than five months after his heart attack, Eisenhower said in announcing that he was available for a second term:

"The work that I set out four years ago to do has not yet reached the state of development and fruition that I had hoped for of a single term in this could be accomplished within the office."

On Aug. 1, having decided to stand by his second term bid despite major surgery June 9 for an intestinal disorder, Eisenhower was told at a Washington press conference that some of his friends were "afraid you won't live for another four years."

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At the close of his speech of welcome to the Moderator, the Rt. Rev. R.F.V. Scott, asked any members of the Original Secession Church if they would stand up. About 200 people in the galleries responded. Thereupon everybody else in the assembly hall applauded and it was some time before the clapping stopped.

At his last official duty as clerk to the United Original Secession Synod the Rev. Robert L. Findlater placed on the assembly table the securities and other documents of the synod, and in doing so remarked that this ends the long separation of 223 years.

HOMEMADE REMEDIES MAY COME IN HANDY

While it's generally advisable to avoid homemade remedies, once in a while they come in handy. Every homemaker should know how to mix a gargle to soothe a sore throat with ingredients that are found in virtually every home.

EASY GARGLES

While there are many on the market, here are some easily made gargles which probably will take away that raw feeling in your throat. If one doesn't work maybe another one will.

SALT WATER MIXTURE

Another easily made gargle is a warm salt water mixture. Just mix a teaspoonful of salt in a glass of warm water. You can gargle with this every hour or so.

A soothing mixture can be made by stirring one teaspoonful of soda in a glass of water. In addition to the soothing effect, it cleanses your throat and helps remove accumulated mucus.

SODA AND WATER

You can make a soda and water paste and smooth it over a sunburn. Cover this with wet cloths. You can repeat this every three to four hours.
