

Thomas J. Flood Appointed Manager

A former Stratford, Ont. resident, Thomas J. Flood has been named general manager of Industrial Enterprises Inc. Austin A. Scates, president of the corporation made the announcement at a press conference earlier this week.

In making the announcement Mr. Scates said Mr. Flood brings to the position a wealth of experience in the highly specialized field of industrial and business development.

"The directors," he continued, "regard the filling of this key position as a major step towards the development of industry here. We are delighted that we have succeeded in finding a man with such a proven record. The board feels itself most fortunate that Mr. Flood is now to utilize his energies for the benefit of the people of this province."

In closing, Mr. Scates said "the task of inducing industry to settle here is one which must be approached with thoroughness and patience. We now feel that the job can now be commenced in earnest."

Mr. Flood will be coming to Prince Edward Island from Stratford, Ont. where he served as manager of that city's industrial commission for 10 years from 1954 to 1964. More recently he has served as business development manager with the Victoria and Grey Trust Company.

Mr. Flood has a wide background in business and in Stratford he is credited with revitalizing the entire economy of that city.

Over a 16 year period in Stratford he was instrumental in permanently locating 29 industries in that city during the time when the former largest employer, the CNR, abandoned its operational centre in the city.

Commenting on his new appointment and his reasons for leaving Stratford, Mr. Flood said that 10 years in a position such as he was in one community was enough, in the sense

that the task appeared completed for the time being. He said he hesitated to move into another Ontario community after spending 10 years trying to beat these other communities out in regard to industry and when the job became available in P.E.I. it appeared challenging.

BORN IN COCHRANE
Mr. Flood, who was born in Cochrane, Ont., received his education at St. Michael's in Toronto and at the University of Ottawa. He worked with the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and with the CNR before World War II when he was commissioned by the RCAF as a flying instructor.

Commenting on his new appointment, he said "Already I can see certain parallels between the Stratford and Prince Edward Island situation, and it's my feeling that this province is on the verge of a sound and successful period of development. The Northumberland Strait crossing is bound to have an important effect on the economy here and its coming opens up very interesting possibilities. It's too early for me to make any definite pronouncements, I haven't been here long enough for one thing, and there are many factors which must be assessed."

Former Island Resident Passes Away By Drowning

ALBERTON — Mr. and Mrs. Fred Clements, Roseville, have received news of the death by drowning of their son, Joseph Jervis Clements. Complete details of the accident have not been learned, but it is known that the accident occurred while he and a companion, David Fairless, were travelling up the Fraser River by station wagon and canoe on a photographic expedition. The young men took turns driving the station wagon and paddling the canoe, and it was while Clements was taking his turn in the canoe, at Williams Lake, on the Fraser, that the accident is believed to have occurred. He was last seen by his companion on Saturday. When he did not show up at their meeting place Fairless returned down the river in search of him. He found the body of Clements, but at last report the canoe had not been located.

VARIETY OF EXPERIENCE

The two young men had been on the trip for three months and had expected to complete it in another two weeks. During his life Clements had a variety of experience. For three years he served in the Canadian Army. The greater part of this time being spent in Germany. While there he toured a number of European countries. Following his discharge he lived in Calgary where he was employed as a taxi driver. It was during this period of his life that he conceived the idea of travelling by canoe to New Orleans. In 1964 he set out with two companions, but he was the only one to complete the five month journey. He travelled alone for approximately 1200 miles before he found a companion who completed the journey with him.

Severin Arsenault Dies In Hospital

Severin Arsenault of St. Christosme, passed away recently at the age of fifty-five after an illness of several months. His death occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital where he had been a patient for several weeks. He was born in St. Christosme, son of the late John P. Arsenault and Eulalie Arsenault and lived here most of his life. A World War 2 veteran, Mr. Arsenault served overseas for several years and was decorated for his valor. He was a fisherman by trade. He was married to Bertha Arsenault of St. Christosme, she predeceased him several years ago. His mother has predeceased him by only a few weeks. He is survived by his only son Victor of St. Christosme. He is also survived by four brothers, Dolore and William of Summerside; Edmond of Charlottetown; and Josey of Sorrel, P.Q.; another brother Arthur predeceased him and six sisters: Lucienne (Mrs. Joey Arsenault), Philomene (Mrs. Meddie Arsenault), both of St. Christosme; Rosida (Mrs. Edmond DesRoches, Leville, P.E.I.); Jplianne (Mrs. Seamus Dunn, Mary Mrs. Jim Thistle, both of Charlottetown; Denis (Mrs. Wilfred LeClaire), of Toronto; and another sister Marguerite (Mrs. Joseph B. Arsenault) predeceased him, also two sisters who died in infancy.

FUNERAL SERVICE

Funeral was held from his late residence to St. James' Church, Edmond Bay, Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the parish priest Rev. Charles Gallant who also officiated at the cemetery. It was a military funeral with the Union Jack draped over the casket. The members of the Wellington Branch of the Canadian Legion attended in a body. Pallbearers were all veterans of World War 2: Franky, Alvo, Herman, Cyrus and Armand Arsenault and Eddy Gallant. Flower bearers were Claude Eldon, Julien and Roland Arsenault.

Liturgical Institute Is Opening Tuesday

Advance registration has reached 425 for the Liturgical Institute which opens here Tuesday evening, Aug. 9, and continues through until Friday morning, with sessions at Basilica Recreation Center.

The Institute, sponsored by the archdiocese of Halifax and the dioceses of Charlottetown, Yarmouth, and Antigonish, is attracting a heavy registration of bishops, priests, religious, and laymen from all four Atlantic Provinces.

The Institute opens with celebration of Mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica at five o'clock Tuesday evening, with Most Rev. M. A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown, as celebrant. The sessions will close with a Mass of consecration Friday at 11 a.m. at the Recreation Center. Mass will also be celebrated at the Center on Wednesday and Thursday at 5 p.m.

The aim of the sessions is to arrive at a deeper appreciation of what is involved in the liturgical changes brought about by Vatican Council II, and has as its theme, "Mind and Heart in Worship". To put it another way, it is intended that the Institute will develop the heart and mind in accordance with the spirit of renewal in the Church, so that the external changes will mirror the inner feelings of the participant.

Dr. MacGuigan Is Appointed

Osgoode Hall Law School and York University in Toronto have announced the appointment of Dr. Mark R. MacGuigan as Professor of Jurisprudence and Constitutional Law. Osgoode Hall Law School, which operated for over one hundred years without university affiliation under the direct control of the Law Society, has, recently joined York University and revealed plans to enroll 1,000 students by 1970. Professor MacGuigan has been on the staff of the University of Toronto Law School for the past six years.

Dr. MacGuigan has been Visiting Professor of Criminal Law at New York University in New York City in the summer session just ended. A second edition of his book on Jurisprudence, in use in most Canadian law schools, will be published on September 1 by the University of Toronto Press.

He is holidaying in Charlottetown with his wife and family. His father is Mr. Justice M.R. MacGuigan of the P.E.I. Supreme Court.

Flying Granddad Reaches London

LONDON (AP)—Max Conrad, the 63-year-old flying grandfather, piloted a twin-engine Piper Comanche into London Friday—his second stop on a round-the-world flight from Montreal.

Conrad's co-pilot is David N. Sheffer, 42-year-old Montreal businessman. They are making the trip to promote the 1967 world's fair in Montreal. The pair arrived at London Airport via Gander, Nfld., after a 16-hour hop. "Everything went fine — no problems at all," Conrad, an American, said. "We are aiming to make some 25 or 30 stops."

CALLS FOR MEN
NICOSIA (Reuters)—Cyprus has called up for military service all Greek-Cypriot males living abroad aged between 18 and 26. An announcement Friday said Greek Cypriots living abroad who are eligible for military service should report to their embassies or consulates.

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
