

# Prince Ranier Questioned On His Plans For Family

 PARIS (AP) — Prince Ranier confirmed Friday with a boyish blush for the benefit of French reporters that he hopes he and Grace Kelly will have several children.  
 His prospective mother-in-law, Mrs. John Kelly of Philadelphia, had told reporters that when the engagement was announced, but at the Havre they asked again when the prince returned from the United States Friday morning on the liner Ile de France.  
 "I will await with equal joy the arrival of a boy or a girl," Ranier replied when a reporter asked which sex he preferred his children to be. Either a boy or girl can succeed to the Monacan throne.  
 The prince is on his way home to direct personally arrangements for his marriage to Grace next month.  
 A few hours later, Ranier drove into Paris in the new station wagon he brought back. He clearly was tired by the drive.  
 "Please," he told photographers waiting outside his bachelor apartment here, "will you leave me alone for a while?" The answer

was another blinding broadside of camera flashes.  
**WON'T STAY IN U.S.**  
 He told the 50 reporters who besieged him at Le Havre that he doubts he and Grace will spend much time in the United States after they are married. He denied expressing a wish that her latest film, "High Society" be banned in Monaco. He said about 600 guests are expected at the religious marriage ceremony on April 19 in the Monaco cathedral. The civil marriage will be performed a day earlier.  
 Of Miss Kelly's career, Ranier said they have made a "mutual decision" that she would appear in no more films.  
 But in New York where she arrived to attend the wedding of her friend, actress Rita Gam, Grace was not so positive.  
 "I am under contract for four years with MGM," she said. "I can't say if I'll be back in pictures. The decision will be made later." But she added she is taking at least a year's leave of absence.  
 In Monte Carlo, a manager of the Monacan national printing plant announced 5,000 wedding announcements have been finished

and are being mailed all over the world. They are printed on British-made paper that has a silver thread woven in it.  
 The prince's yacht, on which he and Grace will make their honeymoon trip, returned to Monte Carlo Thursday night after an overhaul and painting at Toulon.  
 The mystery of Grace's engagement ring appeared solved. There have been reports that when Prince Ranier took it along when he went over to the United States, having picked it out before he even popped the question or knew he would have an opportunity to.  
 Ranier denied this Friday. "I don't run around with engagement rings," he told the reporters.  
 But a friend in Paris told another story:  
 "He left with a small band set with tiny diamonds and rubies. I don't know what he intended to do with it. But the ring he gave Miss Kelly was sent to him in California from Paris. It has a huge diamond and it came from Cartier's."  
 The prince's mother, Princess Charlotte, who lives near Paris, selected it at the shop of the famed Paris jeweler, the friend added.

# Health Minister Martin Rules Out Catastrophic Insurance

OTTAWA (CP)—Health Minister Martin today ruled out catastrophic or disaster insurance as a practical solution for Canada's health needs.  
 He told the Commons estimates committee that no province has seriously advocated such a proposal, though it was raised by "private sources" some months ago.  
 Catastrophic insurance would cover complete medical expenses of all description above a certain fixed floor, perhaps three per cent of a person's income.  
 Mr. Martin said the federal government came to the conclusion that such a plan would require constitutional amendments, be almost impractical to administer

and not reach a large body of people which required protection.  
**TEMPERS FLARE**  
 The question of the federal stand on catastrophic insurance was raised by Donald Fleming (PC—Toronto Eglinton) as the committee continued to study the federal offer to pay half the costs of a hospital and diagnostic insurance plan.  
 He said he had heard members give differing views.  
 "It will let you know my views when we get all the information," Mr. Fleming replied, asking what Mr. Martin meant by "contributory" when he spoke of paying for the insurance scheme.  
 By contributory, Mr. Martin said, he meant that federal costs of Ottawa's share of the scheme—expected to be about \$182,500,000 in the first year—would be assessed against the budget in such a way that taxpayers would know how much they were paying for protection received.

**CHURCH BUDGET**  
 TORONTO (CP) — A goal of "\$5,000,000 and more" has been set for this year's missionary and maintenance appeal in churches of the United Church of Canada.  
 Rev. Victor J. Mooney, United Church treasurer, told a board of finance meeting here that the various departments of the church needed \$5,600,000 for work in Canada and overseas this year.
