DIED.

At Charlottetown, on the 7th inst., at 6 a. m., after a short and severe illness, Elizabeth Dawson, the beloved wife of David Dawson, aged 51 years.

Funeral will leave her late residence on Fitzroy Street, for Covehead Cemetery with carriages, at 1.30 p. m., on Thursday. Friends and relatives are requested to attend.

A FARMER named Wildman, in Unity township, Ill., killed his wife on the night of the 5th inst., and then committed suicide, because she would not make him custodian of her recent inheritance of \$23,000.

THE thunder, lightning and rain storm, which commenced shortly after five o'clock yesterday afternoon, and continued for upwards of two hours, was the severest we have had for several years. No damage is yet reported.

CHIEF POINDRAGON, who figured so prominently in the late Northwest rebellion, and who was recently released from Penitentiary, died on the 5th, at Crowfoot's camp, from bursting a blood vessel. He had not been well for some time.

THE terrible black diphtheria has invaded the towns of Ecorse, Springwells, and Royal Oak, near Detroit, Michigan, and is carrying off large numbers of victims. Children are taken sick without warning, their throats swell, and in a few hours they die in great agony.

THE detectives report that a gang of fifteen thieves have arrived in Montreal from across the border. One of the party, giving the name of McDonald, was arrested at Bonaventure depot while in the act of robbing Madame Conte of her purse. The prisoner is also accused of attempting to rob Mathieu, a hotel keeper there. The gang was attracted from the States by the Hanlan-Ross regatta at St. John's, where they were successful in their operations upon greenhorns.
