Englewood Regional High School, newest in a series of regional schools constructed across the province, was officially opened yesterday afternoon.

Hon. L. G. Dewar, minister of education, laid the cornerstone of the spacious new building that has taken high school students out of 12 country schools and placed them in an up to the minute institution.

Deputy Education Minister Malcolm MacKenzie performed the traditional ribbon cutting ceremony and Canon T. E. Loder blessed and dedicated the structure.

Elmer Inman received the keys from George Smith, representative of G. Keith Pickard, architect who designed the structure and admitted the crowd of several hundred interested parents.

Some 100 students from 12 districts have been attending the school since the first of the year while the contractor, County Tile Ltd. put on the finishing touches. The building houses eight classrooms, a laboratory, library, home economics room and an assembly area.

### Some Areas Expecting First Lobsters Today

Many lobster fishermen in province will be hauling in their first traps today while others will not even attempt to lay their gear for days, perhaps even weeks.

Yesterday, the first day for the laying of gear, prior to the official opening of the 1962 season today, adverse ice conditions prevented a large number of the fishermen from setting traps.

Boats were out from most ports along the east coast of the Island, where no ice was in sight. The bait situation in the area improved slightly yesterday with the arrival of truck loads of gasperax from New Brunswick.

The most severe conditions are in the sector from Tignish to North Rustico, ice has blocked the harbors at Alberton and Tignish, and ice cakes are floating in the inner harbors among the boats.

At North Rustico the harbor is filled with ice, with boats taking refuge in the river. Although the ice could easily move from the harbor at any time, it could just as easily return later and crush any gear in the water, it was stated.

For this reason, fishermen will be reluctant to run gear even if the ice moves out in the next few days.

One fisherman, Lester Weir, Souris, who is going to fish out of North Lake, set out 30 traps yesterday morning and was able to enter North Lake harbor last evening about 7 o'clock.

Some 30 Naufrage fishermen were also bothered by ice yesterday but were able to set some traps. However they don't expect their haul today will be heavy.

More bait was expected in the Souris area from New Brunswick late last night, and although the price - \$15 a barrel - is considered high, the supply is not expected to be a problem from now on.

### IN SOUTHERN KING'S

The lobster season for 1962 got underway yesterday in the Southern Kings area with fine weather and favorable seas. Approximately one acre of drift ice could be seen on the horizon but was not considered to be of any danger to the traps and lines.

Fishermen from most eastern Prince Edward Island shores ran lines and set their traps.

However those fishermen who fish off the reefs and banks from Murray Harbor South, Murray River and Beach Point by previous agreement did not run yesterday because of the danger of shifting winds and heavy ice. Those who fish off the reef will run on Thursday and off the banks will be run on Monday.

This agreement is between the fishermen and is adhered to implicitly. However if the conditions cleared and by agreement the days could be changed.
