Jane Russell And Husband Deny Tiff

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 13 (AP)—Jane Russell, sporting a shiner and a bruised jaw, came back home today. Husband Bob Waterfield met her and a happier couple kissed and hugged each other.

To reports of a rift, both said: "Ridiculous." The reports started in Las Vegas, where Miss Russell went for a premiere. First there was unpleasantness in a night club, when Waterfield objected to remarks by Ben Blue, comic on a stage show, about his wife's celebrated curves.

Then, last night, Miss Russell turned up at the premiere with her damaged complexion only partly hidden by makeup and without Waterfield who had left for home earlier.

Miss Russell and the RKO publicity department said the injuries were caused by a car door, torn from someone's hand by a gust of wind.

Her appearance, and Waterfield's absence, led to immediate queries about trouble between them.

This Miss Russell hotly denied, saying "these reports crop up about every three months. This must be the third month."

Waterfield called the rumors "ridiculous." That was his only comment, but a friend said he returned here ahead of the premiere to do a prearranged radio broadcast.

As Miss Russell stepped from the plane at the airport, she and Waterfield embraced warmly. Then they walked away, arm in arm, chatting and smiling.

The door incident, Miss Russell said, occurred outside a restaurant where they had gone early Monday, a few hours after the trouble with Blue in a hotel dining room.

Bell Telephone Company Report

MONTREAL, Feb. 13 (CP)—Bell Telephone Company of Canada had net income of \$16,203,208, equal to \$2.08 a share, in the second Dec. 31. compared with \$10,323,544, or \$1.33 a share, in the preceding year.

Revenues totalled \$160,781,058, up 23 per cent and operating expenses were \$115,248,224, up 19 per cent. Tax provision was \$22,693,000, compared with \$11,721,000.

Dividends at the usual rate of \$2 a share totalled \$15,614,385 compared with \$13,534,797, in 1950, when the number of shares was 7,800,000, and \$98,822 was added to earned surplus.

Frederick Johnson, president, comments in the annual report: "The higher rates for service in effect from the beginning of the year proved inadequate to our needs. Earnings were somewhat better, but were insufficient to provide an appropriate addition to our earned surplus. Revenues were higher, but so were costs. There was a further substantial increase in both wage and tax rates, which absorbed a large part of the increase in revenues."

tee, was re-elected, and Mr. T. Roy Cudmore and Mr. P. R. McCormac were successful in their bids for seats. Defeated were Dr. L. E. Prowse, chairman of the Finance Committee, and Mr. Charles E. Worth, another newcomer.

What was considered by many observers as a surprisingly heavy vote when there was no contest for the majority was polled yesterday.

In only two of the four wards can an accurate total vote be ascertained as they were straight two-man fights for the single seat available in each. Ward Two showed a total of 252 votes cast for the candidates and in Ward Three the total was 210. In Ward Four there were four candidates for the three Council seats and between them they polled a total of 1,183 votes which was only slightly more than new Councillor T. Roy Cudmore polled in Ward 5 where there were 1,084 ballots cast for him.

In the latter Ward the five candidates for the three seats counted 3,444 votes between them.
