French Forces Pound Rebels In Indo-China

By Larry Allen HANOI, Indo-China, (AP) — French union forces pounded the Vietminh besiegers of Dien Bien Phu Thursday with artillery and airpower.

It was the sixth day of savage struggle for the French fortress in northwest Indo-China and the heavily hammered Communist-led rebels now appeared to be shunning costly direct attacks by masses of infantry.

Their new tactic might herald a rebel withdrawal, but deep in their bunkers behind the barbed wire the confident French forces braced for any new charge that might come.

Amid giant clouds of reddish dust mushrooming skyward under the force of a thousand exploding shells, the French were more than trading blow for blow in a steady artillery duel with the rebels surrounding the plain.
