WILLIAM EMERY MACNEILL

The death occurred on Tuesday, May 10 at the Kings County Hospital, of William Emery MacNeill, Montague, in his 74th year. Born at Cardigan, he was the son of the late Simeon MacNeill and Harriet (MacLaren) MacNeill.
