THE SUMMERSIDE BOARD OF TRADE

The regular quarterly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held in the Council Chamber, Summerside, last evening. The President Wm. Stewart in the chair. A large number of members were present. The Tourist Committee reported that the matter of preparing literature was engaging their attention. Major Schurman reported that the plan for the alterations in the Post Office had been prepared, estimates made and submitted to Capt. Read, for presentation to the authorities at Ottawa. Mr. Schurman also reported on behalf of the Telephone Committee that owing to the change of management the Telephone Company had not yet submitted their order for an all night service. Major Schurman expressed the opinion that some action should be taken with reference to the high rate of insurance as compared with other places, Charlottetown for instance, having rates from 50 to 90c as compared with our rate of \$1.40 to \$1.80.

The cause of this high rate he thought was a scarcity of brick buildings and that the town should offer some inducement to persons building either brick or stone buildings. The matter was strongly endorsed by the President D. A. Pickering, J. W. Johnson, Joseph Read, J. A. Brice, H. W. B. Stavert and others all of whom spoke strongly in favor of Mr. Schurman's suggestion. The following resolution moved by Major Schurman and seconded by Thos. Johnston was put to the meeting and unanimously carried: That in the opinion of this Board the Summerside Town Council be recommended to offer as an inducement to prospective builders of stone, cement or brick buildings that they be assessed only on half the cost of the property for ten years. A general discussion then took place on matters relative to winter communication. The President was appointed as a delegate to proceed to Ottawa along with Capt. Read who goes as a delegate representing Provincial Government as a committee from the Summerside Board of Trade to press the claims from the Board on several important matters for the authorities at Ottawa after which meeting adjourned.

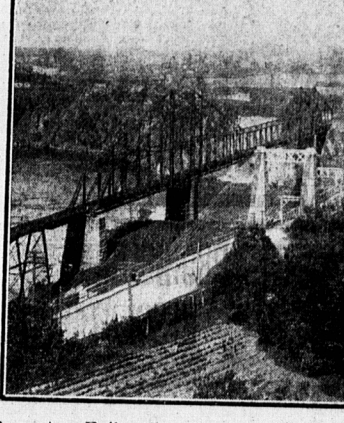

The names of the donors were not announced, but there was one contribution of \$50,000 from a woman member of the Madison Square Presbyterian church, one of \$25,000 from a member of the Brick church, one of \$10,000 from a member of the Fifth Avenue church. Other contributions ranged from \$1 to \$5,000 each. Fully 1,500 persons were present. The meeting was presided over by the Rev. Dr. George Alexander, and the Rev. P. P. 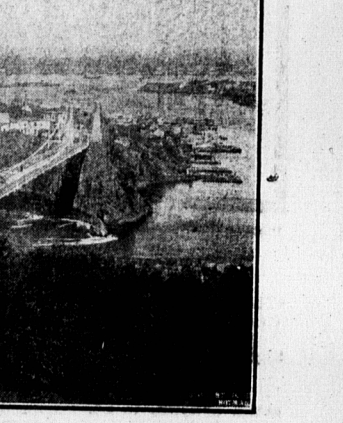
