New PWC Residence Will Be Started Soon

Construction of Prince of Wales College residence will begin before this fall according to a joint announcement yesterday by Public Works Minister, J. George MacKay and Education Minister Keir Clark.

Preliminary plans have now been worked out by the departments and the Architect, C.A. Fowler of Halifax is expected in the City next week to finalize the details of these plans.

The building built of steel and concrete will have three floors and will have sleeping accommodation for 84 students. A cafeteria capable of feeding 250 in relays, will serve all the student body of the college requiring meals.

The residence will be erected on the corner of Kent and Cumberland streets, a property now owned by the provincial government. The existing building will be either torn down or moved from the site.

Library and recreational facilities will form a part of the structure which is said to be the latest in student accommodation. The main building will be 155 x 35 and the cafeteria will be 55 x 55.

LONG FELT NEED

Both Mr. MacKay and Mr. Clark expressed the opinion that the new residence will fill a long felt need among rural students attending Prince of Wales.

They point out that the Women's Institutes of the province have been advocating such a residence for some time.

The women have shown that suitable board and lodging has become more and more difficult for rural students to obtain within the City.

Before considering the present plan officials of the Departments of Education and Public Works visited a number of institutions in the Maritimes and in Toronto with a view to incorporating the most modern facilities possible.

Jimmy Walker Has Hottest Golf

Playing just about the best golf of his career, Jimmy Walker of the Moncton golf club molded together rounds of 73-71-75-77 for a 54-hole total of 296 to tramp off with the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island pro championship over the 5,300 yard, par 71 Riverside course.

The 41-year-old Moncton professional who broke into the game as a caddy when he was only 13 at the Charlottetown golf club, saw his first light as a pro in Pictou, N.S. in 1938 and Jimmy's been on the pro circuit ever since.

He went to Summerside to take over the pro shop in 1939 and then cut short his golfing for a spell while a chief petty officer in the navy. But it was back to the Charlottetown club after the navy jaunt. Following a three-year stint at Amherst Jimmy swung over to Montreal's Elm Ridge.

From Montreal Walker found his way to the Ken-Wo Club in Kentville and he spent the next six years there until switching to the Moncton golf club this year, where he is dishing out lessons to a club that has an enrollment of some 500 golfers.

This was his first winning in all of his years in the N.B.-P.E.I. campaign—Jim says his closest effort—and they were always as a runner-up to Charlottetown's Cecil Dowling.

Household Guard Is Under Training

In a determined effort to equal and perhaps better anything similar the Queen and Prince-Philip may have seen in their Canadian tour, training for members of the local Household Guard has been speeded up.

Duties of the Guard will commence one hour before the expected arrival of the Royal Party and will end one hour after the departure.

Post will be manned at the gate leading to Government House and at strategic points in the immediate area surrounding the gubernatorial residence.

Major Lloyd G. MacNevin, CD, is commander of the guard, all members of which are drawn from the ranks of the P.E.I. Regiment (RAC), Lt.-Col. John A. Macdonald, CD, commanding officer.

Captain W.B. Peters, MM, CD, is officer of the Guard, while WO1 Charles Ryan, CD, is Guard RSM.

The Guard is receiving instructions under the direction of WO. 2 Tom Johnstone of the I and A staff, 2 Militia Group, Colonel A. W. Rogers ED, CD, commanding officer.

Rifle Shoot Starts Today

The 37th annual rifle shoot of the Prince Edward Island Association gets underway this morning at Squaw Point Range.

Shooters from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will swell the number of contestants to about 50 for the first match which starts at 8 a.m.

Besides some handsome prizes being awarded by Island business firms and service groups the shooters will be aiming at 23 places on the provincial rifle team which will be competing at the Comaught Ranges Aug. 10-15 at Ottawa.

The shoot will conclude Saturday afternoon.

Elder Marvin Johnson, second counselor of the New England Mission and Elder Doyle Seely, supervisor of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island district were recent visitors of Elder Glenn Patchell and Elder Wayne Higbee of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

They were here to discuss the growth of the Mormon Church on the Island and new methods of speaking to civic, church and social organizations.

Elder Johnson also announced the arrival of Dr. Edgar B. Brossard as new president of the New England Mission which includes the six New England states and the Maritime Provinces. Dr. Brossard has replaced Junius M. Jackson who has returned with his family to his home in Utah.

Dr. Brossard resigned from the United States tariff commission April 30. He has served on this commission for 25 years and in recent years has served as chairman. Dr. Brossard has been in government service for 42 years and has served under four U.S. presidents.

Elder Johnson, representing President Brossard expressed his appreciation to the people of Prince Edward Island for their friendly acceptance of the Mormon elders. He was very pleased with the progress made in achieving good will for the Mormon Church.

On April 26th the Mormon Church will hold its annual church service at the cathedral of the Pines in New Hampshire. Ezra Taft Benson, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and one of the twelve apostles of the church will be the guest speaker.

CNR Decorating Premises For Coming Royal Visit

MONCTON—In preparation for the Queen's visit to Moncton, July 29, Canadian National Railway premises here are being appropriately decorated.

Some 250 flags and six tri-colored verticals are being used by the CNR on the station premises, general offices building, Canadian National Telegraphs building, and the "subway" on Main Street.

The job of putting up the colorful symbols of loyalty and welcome began yesterday.

At Fredericton, where Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip begin their Maritime tour July 28, the CNR station, city ticket-telegraph office and overpass will be decorated, as also will be the railway premises at Saint John and Shediac, where the Queen and Consort board the Royal Yacht Britannia.

From Shediac the Royal Party goes to P. E. Island. There the CNR station, hotel, telegraph office, car shop and carpenter shop at Charlottetown will be a blaze of color for the event.

From July 30 to Aug. 1 the Queen will be in Nova Scotia on the final lap of her coast-to-coast tour which began with her arrival at St. John's, Nfld., June 18.

Colored window displays featuring 20 by 30 inch framed photographs of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will add a distinctive touch to the CNR decorations at Sydney, Halifax, Charlottetown and Fredericton. Mounted on a four by five foot base and flanked by three Rod Ensigns, the royal photos will be set up in the windows of city ticket offices.

Canadian National Railways decorations throughout the Atlantic Region for the historic occasion exceed 1,200 flags with shields and hundreds of yards of bunting.

HIGH COMMISSIONER VISITS P.E.I.

Complete Reconstruction Is Underway In Pakistan

A complete reconstruction in all branches of national life is following in the wake of last October's revolution in Pakistan, Samuel Martin Burke, Pakistan High Commissioner to Canada, said yesterday.

The High Commissioner, here on a visit with Mrs. Burke, emphasized that the revolution was both peaceful and popular as reforms were necessary due to early "mismanagement by inexperienced politicians".

In connection with his posting to Ottawa Mr. Burke remarked that he was in the position of having a two-way duty — one to learn as much as possible about Canada and another to tell the people here as much as possible about Pakistan.

Official calls

Yesterday he paid an official call on His Worship Mayor Edwin C. Johnstone at City Hall and in the afternoon called on His Honor Lieutenant Governor J. Walter Hyndman. Last evening he and Mrs. Burke were guests of Mayor and Mrs. Johnstone at their home where he was shown a color film dealing with the River Indus from its inception in the Himalayas to its mouth as a practical tragedy of the Pakistani countryside.

Mr. Burke stated the so called revolution in his country called for land reform in order to eliminate the almost feudal conditions existing where West Pakistan was dominated by 'big landlords' while millions of people had little or none.

Now limits have been placed on ownership without the owners being reduced to poverty. Their land was not confiscated outright rather it was divided with the original owners receiving interest-bearing bonds redeemable in 25 years in payment.

Finding that British-style parliaments did not work in a country unused to freedom — due primarily, Mr. Burke said, to lack of any opposition party in the beginning — a new constitutional reform is attempting to bring democracy to the people from the bottom up.

In the new system there is an elected representative for every 1,000 to 1,500 voters and the government begins with authority in the village councils. The next stage is the "Tehsil" or group of villages, the district, regional council, provincial government and finally the central parliament.

1959 Berry Crop Regarded As Poor

Heavy frost during winter and spring played havoc with the Prince Edward Island Strawberry crop which veteran growers maintain will average less than half a normal yield.

Growers in the Pisiquid - Mount Stewart area estimate that this year's harvest will be fifty per cent below 1958 or even lower.

A spokesman for the Charlottetown Strawberry Growers Exchange stated that the concern was averaging only 30 per cent of the amount of berries brought in last year.

Sources close to this industry place the loss on the retail level this year at possibly \$150,000 compared with last years production and sales.

At the Prince Edward Island Hospital authorities stated that the condition of both Franklin MacRae and Owen MacRae remained unchanged. Franklin's condition was still critical while Owen continued to progress satisfactorily.

(Continued from page 1) cial assistance programs is due largely to the accuracy of preparatory estimates based substantially on early analysis of the results of the sickness survey.

TB AFTER AGED

In a panel discussion on tuberculosis, professor John Crofton of Edinburgh said an increasing number of elderly men have been afflicted by the disease in the last few years.

Dr. H. T. McLintock of Toronto said Canadian doctors are finding much the same situation.

McLintock also said Canada had a high mortality among young women but this situation has disappeared and now the mortality is highest among old men. Thirty per cent of the patients admitted for surgery are over 60, he added.

McLintock said there is more tuberculosis among the lower income group, and more in jails than any place else.

The fight against the disease is hampered by a growing attitude in Canada that T.B. is practically a thing of the past, he added.

Machen TKO's Reuben Vargas

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Eddie Machen of Portland scored a sixth round technical knockout over Reuben Vargas of San Francisco in a heavyweight fight here Wednesday night.

Machen weighted 197, Vargas 195.

Referee Ralph Gruman stopped the scheduled 10 - round heavyweight fight at 1:55 of the sixth round and then lay almost helpless on the ropes as Machen pressed the attack.

Vargas had been in trouble in the third round when Machen hit him with lefts and then followed with quick rights. But Vargas weathered that storm and was not in serious trouble again until the sixth.

Machen came out in the sixth with left jabs and constantly followed with rights to the head.
