Synopsis of Canadian North-west Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, exceeding 20, not reserved for the head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 100 acres, more or less.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon the farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

SECOND QUARTER. WORDS AND WORKS OF JESUS AS RECORDED IN THE GOSPELS.

LESSON VIII.—MAY 20. DEATH OF JOHN THE BAPTIST.

Mark. 6: 14-29. Memorize verse 20. (Temperance Lesson.)

GOLDEN TEXT. Be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess.—Eph. 5: 18.

Time.—Late in A. D. 28 or early in A. D. 29.

Place.—Palace and dungeon of Mithras, on eastern shore of Dead Sea.

INTRODUCTION. Herod Antipas was the son of Herod the Great and Malthace, a Samaritan, who, like his father, was noted principally for his disgustingly corrupt and sinful life.

Herod Antipas was the son of Herod the Great and Malthace, a Samaritan, who, like his father, was noted principally for his disgustingly corrupt and sinful life. Diving his first wife, an Arabian princess, he married Herodias, his niece and wife of his half brother, Herod Philip First. Under the influence of Herodias he caused John the Baptist to beheaded for his fearless denunciation of his wicked life.

EXPLANATION. 11. "King Herod"—Herod Antipas, son of Herod the Great. "That John the Baptist was risen from the dead, and therefore might work show forth themselves in him" A snatch of Herod's theology and philosophy.

15. "That it is Elias"—"Elias" being the Greek form of the Hebrew name of the prophet Elijah is our approximate English equivalent.

17. The remaining verses, including this one, are added to the preceding verses by way of explanation; the narrative proper continues in verse 30, the events of verses 17-29 preceding those of verses 11-16. "In prison"—Probably in the dungeon of the castle Machærus, known also as the Black Fortress, on the east coast of the dead Sea, one of the sumptuous palaces of the wicked king. "For Herodias' sake"—On her account probably, and at her demand, Herodias was the grandfather of Herod the Great, and therefore the niece of both Philip (Herod Philip I.), her first husband, and of Herod (Herod Antipas), her second husband, of whom our lesson speaks.

The whole family history of the Herodian dynasty reveals to us an awful condition of social corruption.

19. "For Herod feared John"—She failed to prevail on her husband to put John to death.

21. "A convenient day"—Convenient for the executing of her evil design. "Chief Estates"—The noun is left to the text indicate. The birthday supper was given probably in the same castle in the dungeon of which John lay a prisoner.

23. "He swore"—unto the half of my kingdom.—Compare the words of Ahasuerus (Xerxes) to Esther: "What is thy petition, Queen Esther? and it shall be granted thee: and what is thy request? and it shall be performed even unto the half of my kingdom" (Esther 5: 1-7).

25. "The head of John the Baptist"—It is no sum of money, no queenly robe, no royal palace that she asks, but rather the death of him whom she considers her enemy.

26. "Straightway with haste"—Reflects the urgency of the command, and the character of the daughter, who was like her mother.

28. "This verse presents to us an exceedingly sad picture of degenerate womanhood."

29. "His disciples"—The disciples of John the Baptist.

QUESTIONS ON THE LESSON. What had Intemperance to do with John the Baptist's death? What prompted Herod's estimate of John? Why was the king sorry when he heard the request of Herodias? Should an oath wickedly taken be considered binding in a case like this? Which of the twelve apostles had at one time been disciples of John the Baptist? What impression did the news of John the Baptist's death make on Jesus (v. 30, 31)?
