TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A PANIC THREATENED.

Several Banks Suspend Other Big Failures Excitement On Wall Street.

WALL STREET, N. Y., Nov. 10. The Bank of France holds the destinies of the financial world at the present moment. One thing is needed to stay the growing apprehensions and to avert a panic in London which shall reverberate throughout the civilized world. This one thing is gold. The Bank of France holds the only large available stock of gold in the world. On the 6th November this stock was 47,870,000 pounds. The Bank of England on the same day held 19,228,567 pounds, and the Bank of Germany 23,961,338 pounds. The impression seems to be gaining ground that only prompt action on the part of the Bank of France can avert a panic in London which will be felt all over the world. The situation in London is becoming painfully strained. South America, South Africa and Egypt, in all of which England's moneyed interests are very large and are calling on the Bank of England for more gold, and the bank cannot respond. It is thought probable that the directors of the bank must soon advance the rate to an even higher figure than six per cent.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. Rumors of trouble have been current on Wall Street all day, but it was not until after the close of business the really alarming character of the trouble was known. Three bank members of the New York Clearing House Association were unable to settle the claims of other banks against them. The balance against the Bank of North America was \$1,400,000, which it could not meet. The other banks were the North River, and Mechanics and Traders. During the day the Mechanics and Traders Bank made settlement with the Clearing House all right. The other two banks received assistance from other banks in the Association and pulled through. Decker, Howell & Co., 44 Broadway, assigned to-day. Liabilities about \$10,000,000, while the assets at the present market price largely exceed that sum. The cause of the suspension is the inability to borrow the necessary amount required in the day's business. The firms transaction are very large, it being necessary to borrow several millions daily. Whitney & Co., bankers, also failed to-day. John Y. Walker, Son & Co., importers of silk, 81 Pine st., assigned liabilities \$1,000,000; nominal assets \$1,300,000. The suspension of payment was made necessary by the impossibility of getting at the usual accommodations due to the stringency of the money market.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 11. The plan suggested by the Minister of Agriculture for giving a bonus to bona fide settlers in the Northwest instead of the old policy of assisted passages, is generally commented on favorably. Several of the British farmers' delegates have become complete converts to the Canadian protective policy. One of the Irish representatives last evening announced as his opinion that a similar policy would be the first act of the Irish parliament after home rule is granted. The two Irish delegates intend visiting the Maritime Provinces before returning home. The lumber cut at Ottawa the past season is estimated at seven hundred million feet.

Salvage Case Withdrawn.

HALIFAX, Nov. 11. The life salvage case in connection with the rescue of the five seamen from the wrecked barque Melmerby, has been withdrawn. It will be remembered that E. P. McLean, of New Glasgow, and others issued a warrant claiming \$2,000 for saving the five lives, but the salvors have changed their minds and a discontinuance has been filed.

Another Storm.

LONDON, Nov. 11. A furious gale prevails along the Irish and Welsh coasts, and quantities of wreckage have been washed ashore. The incessant downpour of rain has caused the mountain streams to become torrents, and numbers of workmen's cottages have been swept away.

A Prisoner Released.

LONDON, Nov. 11. Patrick Delany, implicated in the Phoenix Park murders, and serving a sentence of life imprisonment for connection with that crime, who appeared as a witness for the Times before the Parnell Commission, has been released from prison.

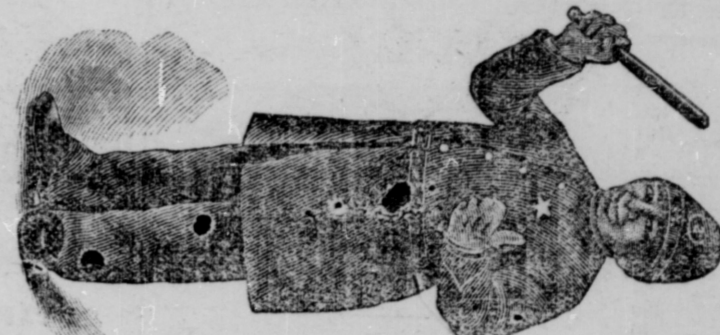

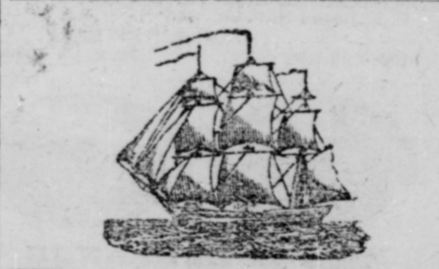
