NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The death of Miss Cameron, this morning, will be deeply regretted by a large circle of friends. It resulted from a stroke of paralysis.

—Yes, we have to admit the Patriot's plea that our Liberal Government have constructed a cattle pen or two,—and to remark that the Patriot is evidently hard up for political capital.

—Congressman Hitt, who worked for the unrestricted reciprocity scheme at Washington while Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright conducted the Canadian end of the campaign, confesses that the purpose of that project was annexation—just as we supposed.

—In view of increased expenditures, for which there is nothing particular in return, and Mr. Tarte's promise that the expenditures will be still further increased next year, it is time for the electors to administer a caution to the government,—and the independent Liberal farmers of East Prince are just the men to do it.

—Le Soleil, Mr. Pacaud's paper, replying to a charge that Dr Guay, M. P., has not yet been appointed to the position of quarantine officer, says that politician can have the job whenever he likes, for he has only to name the day. This, as a contemporary remark, is a nice state of affairs. Still, the country is getting familiar with the independent representative of the people, who goes about with an appointment in his pocket.

—By a cable received by Senator Ferguson from London, we learn that one of his shipments of apples, comprising Ripsons, Baldwins, Kinns, Spies and Rassets, in all thirty-five barrels, have netted nineteen pounds. From this minor charges on this side, such as insurance and wharfage, have to be deducted. But still the results are highly gratifying and prove that P. E. Island apples will command AI prices in England. Most of these apples were too early for their proper selling season.

—The Patriot's news telegrams of last evening report that "THERE IS TALK OF giving to the Kingston Works a contract to build five narrow gauge locomotives for the P. E. Island Railway," and in the same number, in answer to the question "what has the country gained by turning the Conservatives out and putting the Liberals in," the Patriot says, "five new locomotives," etc. Surely the Patriot doesn't hope that the intelligent electors of East Prince will be deceived by such transparent twopenny-ha'penny humbug.

—The people of Summerside will be very much surprised to learn from the Patriot that the Laurier Government, within the last two years, has spent \$30,000 on Summerside harbor. The fact is that the statement is absolutely untrue. Not one dollar has been expended on the harbor. The Patriot is attempting to deceive the electors of East Prince, and to influence their votes. The Parliament of Canada in the year 1897 voted \$30,000 for Summerside harbor. This money was never used and the vote lapsed. This year (1898) the amount was again voted, but up to the present, work has not been commenced,—and is not going to be. The whole vote is an election dodge. It did duty in 1897, to secure Mr. S. F. Perry's election in West Prince; and as it was known to the Laurier government that Mr. Yeo was to go to the Senate, the same trick was adopted in 1898 in order to help the grit candidate at the present by-election. The scheme won't work this time. It is too thin!

We really cannot see why the Government should go abroad for rolling stock when locomotives can be made at Kingston and cars at Cobourg. In this case we stand by Tarte—so long, of course as there is no job at the bottom of it.

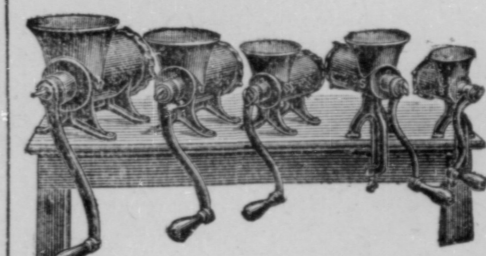
