Family Service Bureau Reports Active Year

Approximately 150 people attended the ninth annual meeting of the Protestant Family Service Bureau in Zion Church Hall last evening. Reports of the various committees were heard and the election of officers for 1965 was announced.

The president, Ralph J. Rupert reported on the work of the board of directors. Mr. Rupert stressed the importance of counselling and case work with individuals and families in new, modern, sound-proofed surroundings.

He thanked the directors of the Prince Edward Island United Fund for their generous donation and expressed his gratitude to local churches. A special mention was made of the donations to the bureau by the Charlottetown Rotary Club, Charlottetown Legion, and the many members and individuals who supported the work of the bureau in 1964.

1964 statistics included a total of 205 new cases which were helped by the bureau. The Charlottetown office interviewed over 2,000 people during 1964 and made a total of 1,065 visits to needy families.

Elizabeth Tomney, executive director for the bureau, reported on 23 cases of unwed mothers who were helped during the past year. Eleven children were placed for adoption by the bureau, last year and all 11 adoptions were completed successfully.

Catherine V. MacMillan, president of the Women's Auxiliary expressed the satisfaction of the auxiliary in the fine work being carried out by the bureau.

Co-Operation Year Stamp Issue Soon

Hon. Rene Tremblay, postmaster general, has announced that a special stamp honoring International Co-operation Year will be issued by the post office department on March 3.

Mr. Tremblay said the stamp forms one part of Canada's contribution to the United Nations' sponsorship of 1965 as a year of international co-operation. Its aim is to foster greater interest in United Nations efforts in the field of international good will, in order to achieve a deep-

er and wider understanding of the aims, purposes and achievements of the United Nations family of organizations. Canada, as a member of the United Nations committee for ICY, heartily endorses this aim, and the year's theme: "Peace and Progress Through Co-operation".

Three diagonally interlocked links, with Canada's maple leaf in the centre are featured and symbolize Canada's role as a link in the world-wide chain of nations. The upper right corner shows the ICY symbol: the United Nations wreath encircling two firmly clasped hands. The words "International Co-operation Year 1965" and "L'Année de la Coopération Internationale 1965" appear at the top and bottom borders.

The stamp will be printed by the intaglio process, a method designed to delineate detail and value with utmost precision. Of large size, the stamp will be dark green. The Canadian Bank Note Company executed and printed the stamp.

River North Spottie produced 8,002 pounds milk, 446 butterfat in the mature class for breed class averages of 106 milk, 110 butterfat. Edgeroad Aim Marie Delight produced 9,499 pounds milk, 511 fat for BCAs of 133 in both milk and fat as a senior four-year-old. Edgeroad Jester's Tidy Melody produced 6,788 pounds milk, 380 fat for BCAs of 119 milk, 125 fat in the yearling class.

Two cows owned by E.A. Myers, Hazelbrook also qualified. Myersbrook Beacon Leah produced 9,954 pounds milk, 565 fat for BCAs of 132 milk, 139 fat as a mature cow. Myersbrook S.B. Anna produced 7,843 pounds milk, 394 fat for BCAs of 129 milk, 120 fat as a junior two-year-old.

8 Deceased Members Paid Tribute By House

Resolutions of sympathy to the families of former members of the Legislature who died during the last year took up most of the time of yesterday afternoon's sitting of the Legislature. In presenting the resolutions, Premier Walter R. Shaw said "never in history have we had so many deaths in a year of men who were once representatives of the Legislature".

All members of the House were given the opportunity of expressing their sympathies over the deaths of John R. MacLean, former Speaker of the House, Russell G. Clark, William Wade Hughes, D.A. MacRae, J. Augustus MacDonald, Lucas Allen, J. Howard MacDonald and Norman MacLeod.

Of John R. MacLean, Premier Shaw said "he was a wonderful representative of the people and the quality of his service remains as a high standard for us to follow in the years ahead."

Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson said "he was a candidate in many, many elections. He was not always successful, but he was always highly respected." Mr. Matheson commended the government for including in the Speech from the Throne a tribute to the late Mr. MacLean.

Commenting on the tributes, Mr. Matheson said "our tributes to former members of the House are not necessarily given because we want to speak of the men we remember so well but because there is another aspect. Every member contributed something—some more than others and some a little. We should try to emulate the good points of those who were here before us."

Premier Shaw said he was in agreement with Mr. Matheson's sentiments.
