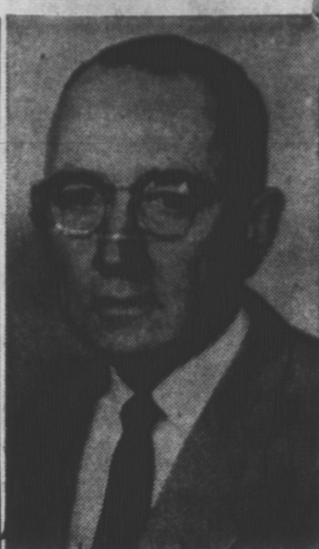


Seed Potato Inspector Retirement Honored

Listening Said Factor In Communication Art

The 44th annual meeting of the Association of Nurses of Prince Edward Island was held yesterday at the Royal Canadian Legion Home in Charlottetown.

A banquet in connection with this meeting was held at the Baslica Recreation Center.

The theme chosen by the President, Sister Mary Hermina, CEM, RN BSc was "The Listening Heart". In her address she stressed the importance of listening as a vital part of communications. She said that conceivably, the greatest tribute paid to a nurse in this age of mechanism and automation may be "she was a good listener, she knew and used the art of listening. To serve our fellow man by listening may require more heroism than the curing of wounds. Listening demands from the listener, selflessness. To listen requires surrendering the privilege of expressing opinions and demonstrating knowledge as well as

foregoing the satisfaction of imparting ideas".

The morning session was concerned principally with a revision of by-laws.

A minute of silence was observed as a tribute to two former members, Eliza Ann Wilson and Mrs. Bernadette MacMillan Trainer and to Dr. Kampe Neugele, former Dean of the Faculty of Arts, University of British Columbia, who died during the past year. Dr. Neugele assisted the Association of Nurses in planning for a study of nursing education for Prince Edward Island.

One of the sessions in the afternoon was a lecture-discussion period conducted by Dr. Kenneth Grant on the use of chemotherapy in carcinoma. Concurrent with the lecture photographic color slides were shown to illustrate the response of tissues to the drug.

EDUCATION STUDY

A report which was awaited with interest by the members was that on the first phase of a Study of Nursing Education in Prince Edward Island, submitted to the Association recently by the director of this study, Glenna Rowwell of Canadian Nurses' Association. This report encompassed short term recommendations for changes in nursing education in the Province.

The number in attendance at the meeting was 125, including guests and honorary members.

The guest speaker last evening was Monerlett Williamson, FRSA, Director, Confederation Art Gallery and Museum who spoke on the value of art in educating young people. He said that educating young people in the fine arts intensifies their powers of observation. He went on to say that listening and observation are allied closely with creativity and it is the creative person who will adjust effectively to a mechanized age.

He also spoke of the purposes of the Confederation Art Gallery and Museum and the educational programme and exhibits conducted in the first year of the center's existence.

Drunken Driving Nets Jail Term

GEORGETOWN — Ralph McGeigan of Cardigan RR 5 pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated and was sentenced to serve seven days in jail when he appeared before Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

The crown was represented in all cases by deputy attorney-general J. Arthur MacGuigan, QC. Everett Compton had a charge of impaired driving against him dismissed following the evidence of Cpl. D.J. Hender, RCMP Montague Detachment, and of the accused himself. He was represented by J.P. Nicholson. Augustus Burke of Lower Montague, represented by J.P. Nicholson and charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned to Oct. 20 to fix a date for trial.

Herbert Lawrence MacIsaac, Georgetown Royalty, charged with impaired driving, had his case adjourned to Nov. 10. He was represented by Kenneth MacDonald.

Torjorn Ulestein of Georgetown, charged with obstructing Georgetown Policeman Allison Grover and represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald, had his case adjourned to Oct. 20 to fix a date for trial.

He was also charged with illegal possession of liquor to which he pleaded not guilty. The case was adjourned to Oct. 20.

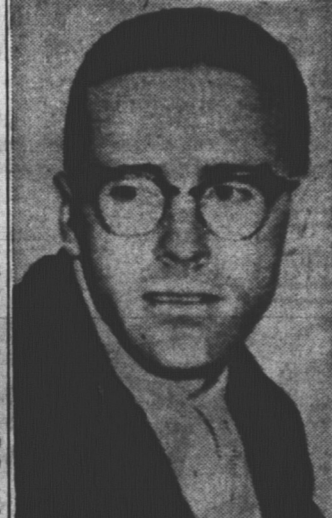
John Loman Keefe of Morell Rear pleaded guilty to a charge of care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired and was fined \$100 and costs.

Federation, mathematics teachers at the grade 9 to 12 level from across the province assembled last night in the Auditorium of Birchwood High School to discuss the formation of a mathematics teachers' association within the P.E.I.T.F.

A "special association" such as this is a group of teachers within the federation organized on the basis of some special teaching interest or teaching skill; operates within the framework and policy of the provincial teachers organization and is designed to improve practice in the particular subject field or area by increasing members' knowledge and understanding, to act as a clearing house for ideas and a source of trends and new development, and furnish recommendations and advice to
