

# Wilson Proposes Mission To Solve Rhodesian Issue

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Wilson has proposed a Commonwealth prime ministers' mission to solve the Rhodesian independence crisis.

He disclosed in a countryside television broadcast that he suggested this in a special message to Rhodesian Premier Ian Smith, who returned to Salisbury after the breakdown of independence negotiations in London.

Wilson said he pressed Smith — if Smith continued to reject independence for the white-ruled central African colony on British terms — to agree to a new Commonwealth initiative, "to a mission of senior Commonwealth prime ministers, representing all the prime ministers and presidents and peoples of the Commonwealth to be reached."

"I know I speak for everyone of all parties, all our people

when I say to Mr Smith 'Prime Minister, think again,'" Wilson added.

**WILL PERSEVERE**

The prime minister, who recorded his broadcast several hours before it was televised, said his government is not giving up in its attempt to negotiate Rhodesian independence.

"Too much is at stake," he declared.

"Yesterday, I got on the phone to the prime minister of Australia, Sir Robert Menzies. Last night I was in direct touch with 19 other heads of Commonwealth governments."

Wilson said the Rhodesian government had been repeatedly warned of what would be involved in seizing independence illegally.

"The whole Commonwealth, 21 nations, without exception, have reinforced these warnings."

He said to their warnings had been added "the voice, urgent, friendly, compelling, of almost every country with whom Rhodesia has had dealings and would wish in the future to have dealings."

He added: "Under our laws, a Rhodesia which took its independence by unilateral action, without the authority of Parliament, would be acting illegally, in a state of rebellion, and we would have to act accordingly."

"But more than that, Rhodesia would, for all practical purposes, be without a friend in the world, unrecognized, illegally governed alone."

## Relatives Sought

EVERETT, Wash. (CP) — Snohomish County coroner Don Baker is trying to locate relatives of a Canadian couple who died of carbon monoxide poisoning Sunday.

"If I cannot find any relatives, the bodies will be given to the University of Washington medical school," Mr. Baker said.

He said Jack John Warner, 33, and Doris Lillian Singer, about 30, parked their car with the motor running during a night trip from Seattle to Vancouver, apparently to sleep.

He believed the couple had moved to the Vancouver area in July from Dawson Creek, B.C.

"Canadian authorities tell me they believe Warner, who also used the names Singer and Nielson, has a wife and family in Nova Scotia, and that the woman, who also used the name Dorothy Worth, has relatives in Toronto."

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

**NORTH**

The bidding:

North East South West  
1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass  
2 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass

Opening lead—four of hearts. This deal occurred in a match between England and France. At the first table, Swimmer-Dyer was South for England and arrived at four spades on the bidding shown.

West led a heart and South was faced with the problem of avoiding a heart loser, since he was certain to lose at least three trump tricks. After taking the ace of hearts, declarer led three rounds of clubs, planning to discard dummy's deuce of hearts if West followed to the third round of clubs.

But West had only a doubleton club and ruffed the third one

with the seven of spades. Declarer overruffed with the eight, trumped a low diamond, and led the jack of clubs, still planning to discard the heart from dummy, if West did not ruff.

At this point the defense was helpless. West actually ruffed with the ace of spades, hoping that East would be able to make three trump tricks by himself, but this did not materialize.

Declarer discarded the heart from dummy and later lost two trump tricks to the K-Q, but he managed to make four spades.

It would not have helped West to discard on the lack of clubs. Declarer would have discarded the heart from dummy and East would have ruffed with the five.

When East then made the best return of a heart, dummy would ruff and lead a trump. The queen an ace would come clattering down together, and South would later lose a trick to the king of spades to make exactly four.

You would think that with this unusual way of drawing trumps the English team was likely to gain on the deal, especially since the best possible contract had been found during the bidding.

However, Desroussaux, playing for France, also got to four spades and made it, and the outcome was that the hand was a complete washout.
