DOLLAR DAY YESTERDAY.—Dollar Day at the city stores yesterday morning promised every success and no doubt would have come up to expectations but for the rain which continued monotonously throughout the afternoon and put a damper on business activities. Today however it is expected, that a large number of out of town visitors will be in the city and that citizens also will take every advantage of the bargains which Dollar Day affords. A close inspection of the special ads in this morning's Guardian before proceeding to the bargain counters will repay every reader.

GOOD WORK AT CAMPS.—The Y.M.C.A. is doing splendid work this year at the camp-grounds of the Light Horse and Infantry Battalion, where the usual recreation tents have been erected and well supplied with magazines and papers, games etc. The arrangements at the Exhibition grounds are under the charge of Mr. Charlie Holland, of Halifax. The recreation tent at the Brighton camp is being run in co-operation with Capt. Geo. C. Taylor, Regimental Chaplain. The Y.M.C.A. men assisting are Mr. Pat McCleery, of Halifax and Mr. John Dunlap Parraboro. The recreational programme consists of sing-songs, concerts, picture shows, step dancing competitions, etc. This is a feature of the camp which the men very much appreciate.

PROMISING LOBSTER SEASON.—Mr. E. Ward Fisher of Halifax, Chief Inspector for the Maritime Provinces and Mr. S. T. Gallant of Charlottetown, Inspector for Prince Edward Island and the Magdalenes, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday, after making a tour of all the lobster factories in this province that have been operating this season. Mr. Fisher was gratified to find that the fisheries in general had greatly improved, particularly during the past three years and this year the improvement has been very marked. The catch on the Island this year will be from 7,000 to 10,000 cases more than last year or about 30 per cent increase. There is a great improvement in the operation of the canneries, which will compare quite favourably with those in Western Nova Scotia. The buildings and equipment as a general rule are immaculately clean. This improvement is the result of the educational campaign which has been carried on for the past three years by Dr. Knight and others. The result of the progress made is that the quality of the Island pack has increased about 50 per cent. General Maritime Provinces have greatly improved during the past three years. The markets are now bare of canned lobsters and Prince Edward Island lobsters are bringing as high as \$34.00 a case. A good quality of dried cod is now selling at \$3.00 per quintal, and the price to the fishermen has increased 30 per cent. The catch of mackerel this year has been exceedingly good in Nova Scotia, and the Magdalenes Islands. In Nova Scotia it will exceed thirty million pounds. On the Island it has been fairly good, particularly in the Alberton District. In the Magdalene Islands in one week 10,000 barrels were taken.

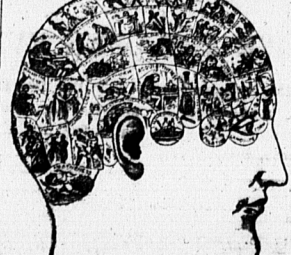
