Under Water Search For Treasure In Bedford Basin

HALIFAX (CP)—Curiosity and
the hope of finding historical treas-
ures and gold bullion are luring
diver John Sweeney of Halifax. He
is making plans to search the wat-
ers of nearby Bedford basin for a
French fleet scuttled 209 years ago.
The one-man undersea expedi-
tion will climax months of research
on the story of D'Anville's fleet
that sailed from France in 1746 to
west coast of Port Louisbourg on
"Cape Breton from the English."
History says many of the 70 ves-
sels were burned and scuttled after

plague took the lives of more than
one-third of their crews. The at-
tack on Louisbourg was abandoned
and D'Anville, preparing to
return to France, died.

Though the story has been col-
ored by fantasy with the passing
of more than two centuries, Sweeney
is convinced the fire-gutted hulks lie
somewhere on the basin bottom.

Sweeney admits that finding the
ship skeletons will be the toughest
part of the job.

Shifting silt has erased any tell-
tale signs of their positions; con-
struction of railways and roads
along the shore has altered 200-
year-old charts and the 1945 ex-
plosion of the Bedford magazine may
have pushed the ships still
deeper into the sand.

D'Anville's successor, D'Estour-
nel, committed suicide or was
murdered before the remainder of
the fleet set sail for France.

When D'Estournel's crew refused
to sail his ship, it too was scuttled
and the commander's ghost is said
to still roam among the phantom
men-of-war.

The six-acre miles Bedford ba-
sin, an extension of Halifax harbor
was used extensively during the
Second World War as a jumpoff
point for Atlantic convoys.

U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel Mag-
azine predicted today near-record
steel production for March and
said high output should continue
beyond the second quarter.

The metalworking weekly re-
ported ingot production rose a
point last week to 92.5 per cent of
rated capacity, highest since mid-
October, 1953.

Steel continued:

"Expanding requirements for
building, line pipe, tank and sim-
ilar construction, of course, are
seasonal. But there is every indica-
tion these fields will provide
volume demand this year that will
rank close to the record, if not ex-
ceed it."

"At the same time, such lines
of manufacture as appliances and
general fabrication are providing
sturdy demand. Export business
also is a substantial market prop."

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Less Wood Used In Building

OTTAWA (CP)—If builders still
used as much wood today as they
did 30 years ago, Canada's forest
products industry couldn't fill their
needs, a forestry expert says.

Opening the third annual meet-
ing of the Forest Products Re-
search Society, eastern Canada
section, Chairman J. H. Jenkins,
referred to a United States report
that showed U. S. lumber con-
sumption per dwelling unit de-
clined by 44 per cent between 1920
and 1953.

The same report, he said, show-
ed the percentage of lumber used
in building houses fell faster be-
tween 1950 and 1953 than in the
previous 30 years.

He said the forestry industry has
not kept pace with Canada's ex-
panding national development.

"Had wood retained its former
ascendancy in the building ma-
terials field, our present total
production would fall far short of
the required supply."

BUT STILL GROWING

Despite changes in construction
materials, with resulting loss in
markets, the forest products in-
dustry had continued to expand.

But Mr. Jenkins, chief of the
forest products laboratories here,
urged delegates attending the
three-day meeting to make fuller
use of technical data now avail-
able and to intensify industrial re-
search.

"With concerted efforts the forest
products industries can substi-
tutably build up present mar-
kets and gain new ones," he said.
