

Darkhorse Brazil Threatens Spain

Darkhorse Brazil had defend- ing champion Spain within a single game of elimination when darkness halted the fifth set of the fifth and final match Monday in the second round of the European Zone Davis Cup tennis competition.
First, Thomas Köch of Brazil tied the series at Barcelona 2-2 by beating Spain's No. 1 ace,

Manuel Santana in straight sets 7-5, 6-2, 6-1.
Then José Edison Mandarino of Brazil took the court against the young Juan Gisbert for a marathon struggle at the Royal Tennis Club where the Spaniards upset the United States last year and qualified to meet Australia in the challenge round.
The match lasted 4½ hours and was halted because of poor visibility, with Mandarino leading 7-5, 3-6, 9-11, 8-6, 5-4. The battle will be resumed today with Gisbert facing sudden death, serving.
BRITAIN WINS
In other Davis Cup matches, Britain defeated Hungary 3-2 at Budapest and South Africa 4-1 at Scheveningen 4-1 to enter the quarter-finals.
At Budapest, Britain's Roger Taylor beat Istvan Gulyas of Hungary 16-18, 6-3, 6-4 in a match halted the previous day in the third set by darkness.
South Africa divided the final two singles with The Netherlands after clinching the series Sunday. The only Dutch point came when Tom Okker, the Netherlands champion, beat

Keith Dierpram 6-2, 6-2, 8-4. Cliff Drysdale, the South African champion, finished off the series by trouncing Jan Hajer 6-2, 6-1, 6-1.
Koch's victory over Santana, winner of the U.S. national championship last year and rated one of the world's best players, came as a surprise. Santana has a remarkable eight-year record in Davis Cup play, with no previous losses at Barcelona.

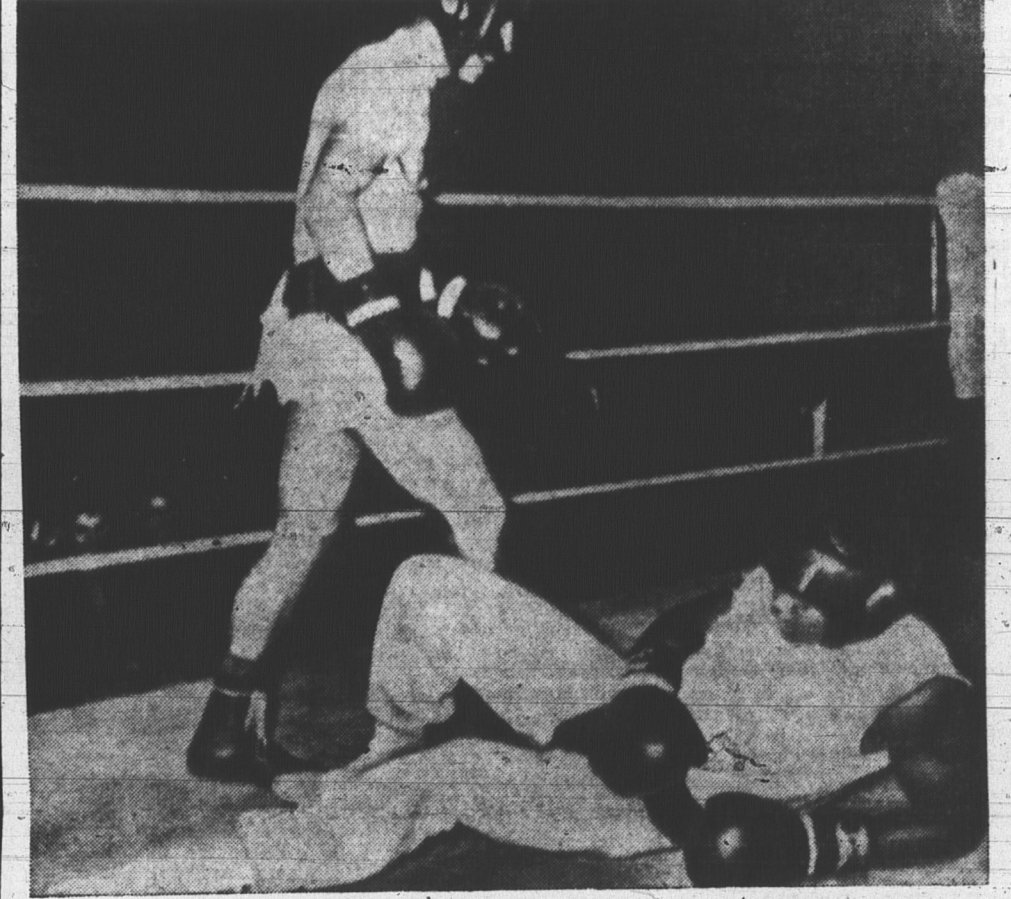

COOPER, CLAY TEST JAWS



TIBBS LAUGHS AT CLAY'S "FALL" IN TRAINING

Heavyweight Titleholder Will Be Decided Saturday

LONDON (AP) — Cassius Clay is rated as 11-2 favorite to retain his world heavyweight crown in his fight Saturday with British champion Henry Cooper in London's first heavyweight title fight in 58 years.
The fight has whipped up something approaching hysteria in this sports-mad city.
A sellout crowd of 46,000 is assured at London's open air Arsenal Stadium, the home of one of England's most famous soccer clubs.
Another 40,000 are expected to watch a closed circuit television relay of the fight at about 20 movie theatres. Thousands more will be following the contest on pay television.
Millions will see the fight in the United States, Canada, Mexico and other countries via the Early Bird Satellite.
ODDS VARY
Bookies, trying desperately to whip up betting interest, have come up with some strange odds.
You've got to lay out \$11 to win \$2 on Clay. A \$2 bet on Cooper will get you \$11 if the Briton pulls off the upset of the century.
You can have 7-1 against Cooper going inside the first three rounds, 8-1 against him winning in rounds four or five, and 12-1 against him pulling it out between the sixth and ninth rounds.
It's 3-1 against Clay in the first three rounds and 4-1 against the American winning between the fourth and seventh rounds.
Promoter Harry Levene and Jarvis Astaire, managing director of the firm showing the fight on closed circuit television, have teamed up for what is described as the most expensive fight promotion in the history of British boxing.
Clay is reported to be receiving a \$200,000 guarantee, with Cooper assured of \$112,000, both will collect extra money from ancillary rights.
Levene refused to give any indication of what he expected to collect from the fight. But ticket prices ranged from \$58.80 for ringside seats to \$5.88 for standing space.
BURNS WON
The last time Britons saw a world heavyweight fight was Feb. 10, 1906, when Tommy Burns of Hanover, Ont., knocked out Jack Palmer in the fourth round.
Clay, strangely subdued compared with the man Londoners

last saw in 1963, expects to weigh in around 204 pounds.
"I've got to talk with my fists."
He's not forgotten that it was Cooper who floored him in the fourth round of their open fight in London June 18, 1963. Clay went on to win the next round as Cooper's eyes spurted blood.
"That punch from Cooper was the hardest anyone has landed on me," Clay said.
Clay, 24, unbeaten in 23 pro fights, is rated one of the fastest heavyweights in history. He moves around the ring like a lightweight and relies on an accumulation of punches to soften up his opponent.
Cooper, who celebrated his 32nd birthday last week, can rate himself a lucky man to get the shot at the title.
The Briton's best punch—the only one likely to trouble Clay—is a lightning left hook. That's the punch that put Clay down.
Cooper, British champion since 1959, has won 32 fights, lost 11 and drawn one. He was knocked out in the fifth round by Ingemar Johansson of Sweden in 1957 and has dropped decisions to American fighters such as Zora Folley, Roger Fischer and Amos Johnson.
George Smith, a 55-year-old Scot, will referee the fight. He is the sole person in charge. There are no outside judges under British rules. The referee's verdict is final.

Twins Shade Senators

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Reliever Casey Cox walked Cesar Tovar with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth inning Monday, enabling Minnesota Twins to defeat Washington Senators 2-1.
Harmon Killebrew led off the ninth with a single, the seventh hit off the Senators' Phil Ortega. Andy Kosco ran for Killebrew. Pinch-hitter Sandy Valdespino forced Kosco on an attempted sacrifice. Bernie Allen singled, sending Valdespino to third.
Cox relieved Ortega and walked pinch-hitter Don Murcher intentionally, filling the bases. Cox got Zoilo Versalles to hit into a forceout at home. But the reliever then walked Tovar on four straight pitches.
Camilo Pascual went the distance for Minnesota, posting his sixth victory against one loss. He gave up seven hits.
The Twins took a 1-0 lead in the third when Versalles tripled and scored on Tovar's sacrifice fly.
Jim King tied it for Washington, leading off the fourth with a 375-foot drive over the right field fence.

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit Tigers manager Charlie Dressen was admitted to a hospital here Monday for a possible heart attack.
A Tiger spokesman said Bob Swift, third base coach, has been appointed acting manager of the American League baseball club.
Swift had taken Dressen's place last year from March 8 to May 31, when Dressen had a heart attack.
The hospital spokesman said it will be several days before it can be determined whether Dressen, 67, has had any heart damage. He is being observed in the cardiac care unit of Ford Hospital.
When he took over the club it was in ninth place. Since then, the Tigers have tied for fifth place once and finished fourth twice.
