MONDAY

NEW APPOINTMENT FOR MR. NELSON McEWEN—The resignation of Mr. Nelson McEwen, general secretary of the Y.M.C.A., Saint John, to take the post of metropolitan general secretary of the Y.M.C.A. in Winnipeg, has been accepted with regret by the board of directors of the Saint John association. Mr. McEwen, whose new appointment brings about his return to Winnipeg from Saint John for the second time, will take over his duties there in the fall, when he will assume supervision over all the association's activity in that city.

CAR ACCIDENTS—There were two car accidents near St. Eleanors over the week-end. About two o'clock Sunday morning a 1948 Plymouth sedan driven by Flying Officer Norman Beatty, who was accompanied by Mrs. Beatty, landed on its side in the ditch as a result of being in col-

lision with another car in which the cars sideswiped each other. F.O. and Mrs. Beatty were taken to the Prince County Hospital but Mrs. Beatty was released shortly after. F.O. Beatty was suffering from a cut on the head but was discharged later yesterday. The name of the driver of the other car was not obtained but apparently he was not injured. Yesterday afternoon about one o'clock two cars were in collision at St. Eleanors corner but there were no injuries. Both cars suffered slight damage.—S.

ACCIDENT ON HIGHWAY—A 1951 Ford driven by a Georgetown man was struck by a 2-ton truck a few miles from Georgetown on the new paved highway Saturday night. None of the occupants of either the car or truck were seriously hurt, although one occupant of the car received a cut above the eye. The car was proceeding from Georgetown towards Montague, when

the truck, which was coming towards Georgetown, struck the car on the left front fender, smashing the forward part of the body, the radiator, and twisting the frame and wheel. The truck then skidded off the side of the road, and continued into the ditch. The car was badly damaged, but the truck received only minor damage. This records the second accident on the new highway during the past two weeks. A car proceeding from Georgetown in the evening went into a hole dug out by the workmen replacing a section of the pavement. No one was hurt in this accident either.

Mr. B. Earl MacDonald, representative of Charlottetown and Royalty in the Legislature, has made it known that some highway paving will be done in his district this year.

A portion of the Mt. Edward Road will be given a permanent surfacing, and the preparatory work is now well advanced. Another section of road approved for paving is the one leading from the vicinity of the Belvedere Service Station on St. Peter's Road to Falconwood Farm and the golf links. Traffic on this latter road is quite heavy, and the Government approved the suggestion that it be improved. On the Mt. Edward Road, many new homes have been built in the last few years and the extension of the pavement is expected to lead to further construction in the near future. So rapid has been the growth that a new suburb is taking form embracing the Mt. Edward Road and once open countryside between Mt. Edward Road and the Brackley Point Road.

Entry was gained by means of a small window which opened on the alley way at the side of the building. It is about ten feet from ground level.

A decision of the Law Society suspending for one year a member of the Bar of this Province was upheld by the full bench of the Supreme Court of the Province yesterday, but according to counsel for the appellant an appeal from the Court's decision will be made to the Supreme Court of Canada.

In its decision yesterday the Island Supreme Court stated there was no reason to disturb the findings of the Law Society. The suspension of the appellant, whose name did not appear in the Court proceedings, dates from May 21 last and applies to his practices as barrister and solicitor. The case had been adjourned from last Friday.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Smith, New Orleans, La., spent a week visiting on Prince Edward Island. This is the first visit Mrs. Smith (the former Anna Farrell, Tignish, a sister of Dr. Philip Farrell, Boston) has made to her native Province for forty-three years.

While on the Island Mr. and Mrs. Smith visited with Mr. and Mrs. Swithin McKenna, Chelton, Sister St. John, Bishop's Residence, Charlottetown, a cousin of Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Sandy Shea, Tignish, and several of Mrs. Smith's cousins in the western part of the Island. Mr. Smith, a marine engineer and a native of Louisiana, was very much impressed with the beauty of the Island, this being his first visit. He hopes to make a more extended visit next time.

On June 28th the Rev. Father Pius Finnian, native of Bloomfield Parish, P.E.I., received the Sacrament of Holy Orders from His Excellency, Bishop Charles LeBlanc, D.D., of Bathurst. The ceremony was held in Bathurst, East Church with twenty-six monsignori and priests present. A sumptuous banquet prepared by the parish's '45 Women Organization' was held in the Parish School Auditorium.

The Rev. Father Levesque and his curate Father Patrice Doucet presented the new priest with a beautiful cathedral cake. During the banquet, presided over by His Excellency the Bishop, professional singers rendered "Gounod Ave Maria, Cesar Frank's Panis Angelicus and other excerpts from the classics. The Boy Scouts waited on the tables. The toastmaster, Father Levesque, first called upon His Excellency to speak, who was followed by other dignitaries.

The boat races at Alberton South on Wednesday afternoon were an event of interest to many people here. High winds and intermittent showers cut attendance to about 500 spectators. The races got underway soon after three with Mr. J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A. as starter and Messrs. John C. Matthews, Russel Matthews and Vernon England as judges.

The official opening of the new children's playground at Stemon Park, R.C.A.F. Station Summerside took place on Monday afternoon. It is equipped with swings, slides and teeters and a special fenced-in section for small children. Three supervisors will be on duty there all day and they are provided by the Women's Auxiliary. Two of them will look after the little ones and one will supervise the activities of the older children.

Hon. Hughes Lapointe, Minister of Veterans Affairs, Ottawa (above) is spending a brief holiday in the Province as part of his tour of the Maritime Provinces. Arriving in the City Tuesday the Minister visited the local D.V.A. office and conferred briefly with officials there. He later visited the two hospitals and the Provincial Sanatorium to call on hospitalized veterans. He is staying at Dalvay until the end of this week.

A Prince Edward Island Regiment, the 5th Signals have won the Jimmy Trophy awarded for the highest aggregate in Warrant Officers competition in Canada. Lt. Col. K.M. Johnstone, Commanding Officer of the Fifth Signals Regiment has informed The Guardian.

The competition is held annually between all signal regiments and squadrons in Canada who write a set of examinations prepared by the Canadian Signals Association. This year is the first time the Jimmy Trophy has been awarded. The examinations were held last April.

Rainfall during July, which amounted to 5.32 inches, was considerably higher than average for the month, it was learned yesterday from Mr. Warren Burns, weather observer at the Experimental Station, Charlottetown. The average rainfall for July is 2.98 inches, stated Mr. Burns. He said that during the past month there were eleven days of rain.

The average temperature for the month was 67.6 degrees, slightly more than the 42 year average of 66.3 degrees. The day time temperature was 75.4 degrees and the temperature at night 59.8. The thermometer recorded 80 or over on eight days during July.

GIVE SHOW AWAY—Gully consciences tricked two Summerside youths to giving themselves away yesterday when they saw the police patrol approaching. The boys carrying bundles were walking along a street and when they saw the patrol they dropped the bundles and ran. Sgt. Schurman and Sgt. Matheson who were on a routine patrol became interested at this action and investigated. It developed that the bundles contained jute bags which had been stolen from a warehouse. Apparently second hand jute bags bring good prices and police estimate that about \$25 worth of bags were taken some of which has been sold. One of the youths will appear in police court. The other is younger and will come up in juvenile court. — S.

The home of Mr. Herbert MacLeod, Southampton, was completely destroyed yesterday morning when fire broke out in the attic.

Mr. MacLeod noticed smoke around the fire early in the morning and put it out himself. At 8 o'clock he again opened the door to check and found the attic blazing.

St. Peter's Fire Department was called but was unable to save the building, and all household items were lost but a few lighter articles which were rushed from the second floor to hundreds of dollars in cash which had been upstairs was also burned.

This year a new industry, which should bring extra cash to farmers, is being tried out in the Montague area of King's County.

Early in the Spring a representative of the Canadian Canning Co., of Middlesex, N. S., visited the Island, and contracted with various farmers in the district to grow beans for canning.

As an experimental venture the individual acreage is low, ranging from one quarter to one acre per farmer. The beans are planted as a row crop, either in drills or on the flat, about 30 inches apart. It requires about 150 pounds of seed to plant an acre and the seed is treated to control insects and disease.

Marion MacKay, six year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester MacKay, Kensington, is a patient in the Prince County Hospital following an accident in which she was struck by a car on a Kensington street last 4:30 yesterday afternoon. Medical reports last night indicated that she was on the danger list and is suffering from a broken leg and broken shoulder.

She was struck by a car driven by Mr. Desmond Callaghan, who is at present relieving the C.N.R. station agent at Kensington. As far as could be learned, the child ran out from behind a tractor that was meeting the Callaghan car and was hit but not run over. The accident occurred opposite the White Rose Service Station on the street leading out of town towards Summerside. She was immediately rushed to the Prince County Hospital. — S.

Miss Evelyn Henry, Keppoch, who surprised the Maritime recently by swimming the Normanumberland Strait from Cape Tormentine to Borden, was honored last night by the Provincial Government.
