Holy Bible Has Great Influence. Nearly 300 books dealing with biblical subjects are published in Israel every year. The Bible (Old Testament) has an important influence on the daily life of the Israelite. Radio programs begin each day with the reading of a Psalm or passage from the Pentateuch; in the evening further passages are read with commentary. In the course of a year the whole of the Old Testament is read in this way. At school parties of the Old Testament are given as soon as the child can read it. It is reckoned that 25 per cent of study time at school has some connection with the Bible, and ordinary conversations in Israel are frequently interspersed with biblical quotations. During 1963 the Bible Society Agency in Israel arranged for the printing of 15,000 Russian New Testaments and 24,500 Hebrew New Testaments. It is the thirteenth year since the Agency re-organized its work in the new state of Israel more than
