FIRE MEETING.—At a meeting of the new Board of Fire Wardens held on Tuesday evening, A. N. Large was unanimously re-elected chief of the Department for the current year, and Messrs. William Taylor and William Murray, jr. were also re-elected first and second assistants respectively. Mr. H. M. Davison was elected clerk to the Board. A committee of three consisting of F. P. M. Carron, A. D. White, and Thomas Campbell was appointed to draw up estimates for the year.

DOMINION ELECTION.—A meeting of Liberal delegates is called for 2 o'clock this afternoon, at the Court House in Georgetown, to select candidates to contest King's County, in opposition to Messrs. McLean and Macdonald, the Liberal-Conservative nominees.

The Prince County Liberal Convention, to have been held at Summerside yesterday, was postponed until to-day owing to the non-arrival of some of the delegates. The delayed candidates are due at three o'clock this afternoon.

The Liberal Conservatives of Prince County are also holding a convention in Summerside to-day, as advertised.

A STARTLING ACCIDENT.—An exchange says: A strange and startling accident occurred at Lynn, Mass., not long since. As usual, wires carried the electric force from powerful dynamos to the electric lighting station. The station took fire and the wires were burned off. The current, while still being generated, was thus cut off from a vessel. The mechanical energy which had been previously converted into electricity was thus thrown back upon itself. Instantly the large fly wheel of the 200 horse power steam engine began to revolve with lightning speed, and before the machinery could be stopped the centrifugal force had burst it into fragments, which flew in all directions. The energy which supplied the electric light had been suddenly by the accident transformed into centrifugal power, which burst the wheel.

Hockey Match.

About three hundred spectators witnessed the Hockey Match in Hillsborough Rink last evening, the proceeds of which were in aid of the P. E. Island Hospital. The Citizens' Band, which offered its services gratuitously for the occasion, played some fine selections. The teams lined out as follows:

The match commenced shortly after eight o'clock, with the East defending the northern goal. In this game the West seemed more than a match for their opponents. In the second game both teams were well warmed up to their work, and both cut a lively pace. For a time the East had the advantage, and it looked as if they might score a goal at any moment. The ball was, however, gradually worked up by the West and again sent through the goal by Dr. Johnson.

Both teams worked hard during the third game, but the West had clearly the advantage this time. By brilliant team work the ball was passed to Johnson, who quickly scored his third goal for the West.

The fourth game was marked by fine play on both sides. The ball was kept dangerously near the West goal for some time, until Rundle quickly secured the ball and by a splendid dash passed three or four opponents and scored the fourth and last goal in grand style. Score: West 4; East, 0.

On the whole, the West played a more scientific game and passed better than their opponents. They played more for team work, rather than individual honor. Two halves of forty five minutes each, with ten minutes' rest, were played. The spectators were delighted with the game, and liberally applauded the several fine plays made by Mr. Jas. Sullivan, and Mr. Jos. Smith, (formerly of the New Glasgow A. A. C.) were the umpires. The proceeds amounted to \$35.

LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

In King's County.

MACDONALD AND McLEAN

Unanimously Nominated.

THE Convention of the Liberal-Conservatives of King's County, held in Georgetown on Tuesday, the 10th inst., notwithstanding the inclement weather, was attended by a large number of delegates from the several polling districts.

Hon. D. Gordon, President of the King's County Liberal-Conservative Association, occupied the chair.

Among those present were Hon. Senator Prowse, Hon. James Clow, Hon. Archd. J. Macdonald, Wm. A. Poole, Esq., M. L. C., Angus McLeod, Esq., M. P. P., J. C. Unterhay, Esq., M. P. P., and Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. P. P.

The delegates from the Cardigan District being requested to nominate a candidate to occupy the seat lately held by the late Hugh L. Macdonald.

It was proposed by Ronald J. McKenzie, Esq., Dundas, and seconded by Mr. Edward Sharkey, of Corraville, Lot 53, and carried unanimously, that James E. Macdonald, Esq., of Cardigan Bridge, be the candidate of the Liberal-Conservative Party at the ensuing election for the Third Electoral District of King's County.

James E. Macdonald, Esq., in accepting the nomination, said he felt assured that all present regretted the sad circumstances that had caused a vacancy in the representation of the Cardigan District. The late representative, the Hon. Hugh L. Macdonald, was a gentleman who had secured the affection and esteem of all; and his name would long be remembered by the people of the Cardigan District as one of the biggest hearted men who has ever lived among them.

Hon. D. Gordon, in calling the County Convention to order, said that the present occasion was one of unusual importance in the history of our country. He pointed out the importance of the issues that are now before the electors of Canada in general and this Island in particular, and said he hoped that the same unanimity that had hitherto characterized the proceedings of the Liberal-Conservative Party in King's County would be shown on the present occasion.

Mr. Geo. F. Owen said that as several gentlemen had been spoken of as candidates at the ensuing Dominion Election, it probably would be conducive to the expediting of the business before the Convention if those gentlemen who had been spoken of as candidates, would express their views and policy before the delegates.

Consequently A. C. Macdonald, E. B. Muttart, and John McLean, Esquires, made brief addresses.

Dr. Muttart in the course of his remarks intimated that it was not his intention to contest the present election.

On motion of Hon. James Clow, seconded by Mr. Edward Sharkey and W. A. Poole, Esq., A. C. Macdonald, Esq., was nominated as a candidate to contest the present Dominion Election for King's County.

It was moved by Michael McCormack, Esq., of Souris, and seconded by Ronald J. McKenzie, Esq., of Dundas, that John McLean, Esq., of Souris, be a candidate for King's County at the ensuing Dominion Election. Both nominations were carried unanimously.

Messrs. Macdonald and McLean in strong and eloquent speeches thanked the delegates for the unanimous nominations they had received, and urged on those present the necessity of hearty and untiring effort by all members of the party at the forthcoming contest.

On motion of A. C. Macdonald, seconded by John A. Cameron, the following was adopted:

Whereas, E. B. Muttart, Esq., has been, for the past twelve years, one of the standard bearers of the Liberal-Conservative party in King's County; and has, during that time, always fought its battles with unswerving devotion and ability—

Therefore Resolved, That while we regret that he does not see fit to allow himself to be put in nomination on the present occasion, this Convention desires to express their sincere thanks to Dr. Muttart for his past services.

After the candidates had suitably acknowledged the hearty nomination they had received, stirring speeches were made by Hon. Senator Prowse, John Nichols, Esq., Cyrus Shaw, Esq., Mr. John Weatherbie and others.

The Convention having given three hearty cheers for Her Majesty the Queen, Sir John A. Macdonald, the candidates for King's County, and Dr. Muttart for his past services, quietly dispersed.
