### Psychiatrists Take Part In Disaster Hit Springhill

EDMONTON (CP) — Two psychiatrists arrived at Springhill, N.S., at 3 a.m. last Nov. 3, and their first impression was one of "tense gloom."  
"Thirty hours before their arrival an explosion had trapped 133 men deep in the No. 4 shaft of the Dominion Coal Company mine. When the final count was made days later, there were 39 dead including two rescue workers."  
"The psychiatrists had made the 130-mile trip from Halifax "in anticipation of psychological repercussions" on Springhill's 87,500 residents. It was not a planned action—they had come on "an instinctive impulse."  
**DISTRESS CENTRE**  
Soon, there were five psychiatrists and one social worker organized into psychiatric teams. They set up a "distress centre" in Springhill's legion hall—a sort of "psychiatric first-aid centre" which operated four days.  
It marked the first known attempt by psychiatrists as such to participate in a disaster action.  
The results of their experiment are outlined in a paper prepared by Dr. R. J. Weil and Dr. F. A. Dunsworth, both of the department of psychiatry at Dalhousie University in Halifax.  
The paper was made available to reporters during the recent annual meeting here of the Canadian Medical Association.

come "quite hopeless." Suddenly came news that three buried miners had been rescued, and "the air of hopelessness and gloom changed into an atmosphere of exhilaration and optimism."  
**QUICKLY DAMPENED**  
But the three miners told of the deaths of several of their fellow workers, and of dangerous gases collecting in the shaft. "The possibility of a renewed explosion very quickly dampened the prevailing spirit of optimism."  
Then more people began arriving at the centre. Some simply required reassurance, but others needed mild sedation and sometimes tranquilizer pills.  
"During this period of anxious, uncertain anticipation, it became particularly evident that eating and drinking—sandwiches and coffee were available everywhere—acquired in increasing manner a tension-reducing function."  
When the rescue work was completed, and the mine was sealed off, then "the town began slowly to readjust to the inevitable pressures of reality," says the paper.

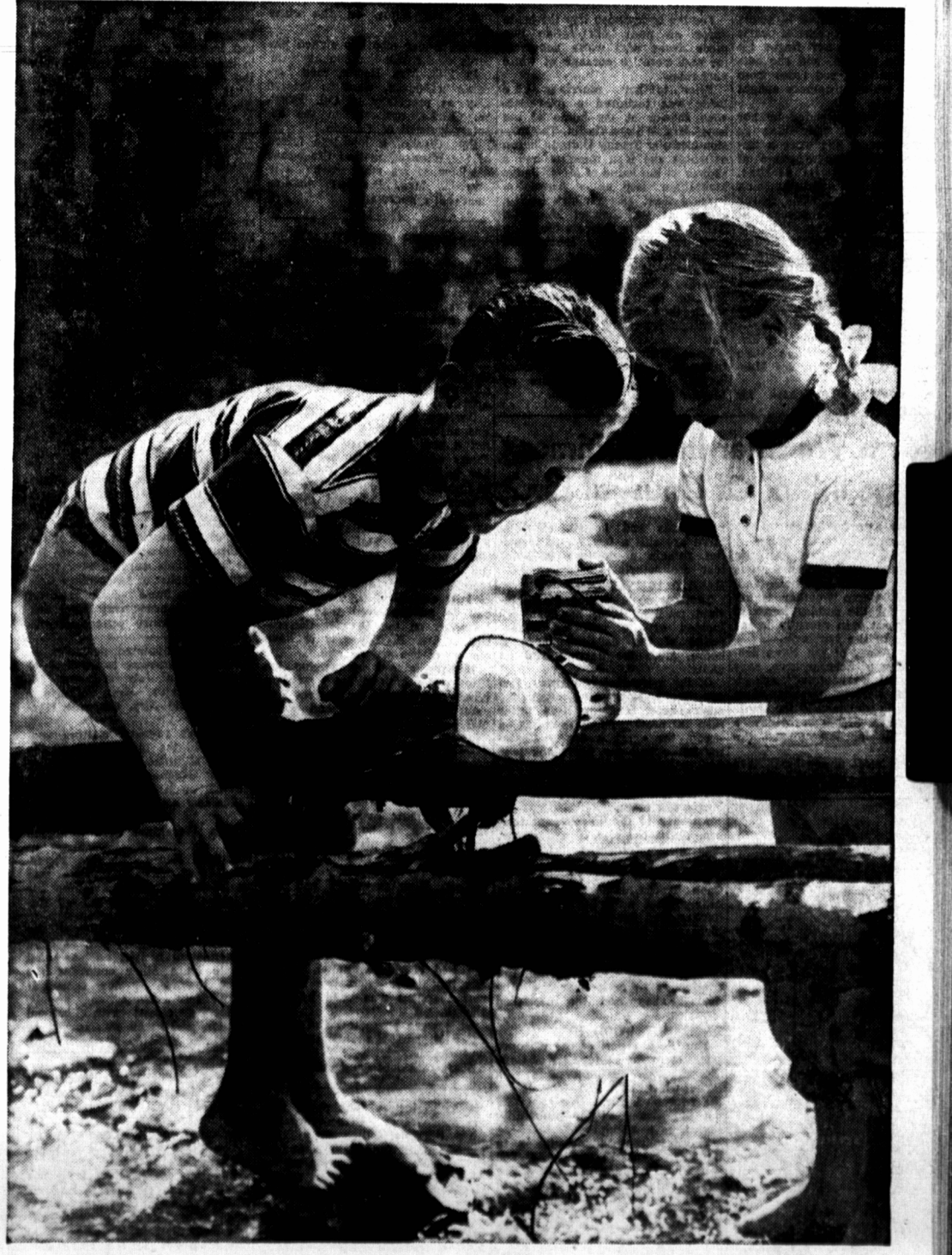
