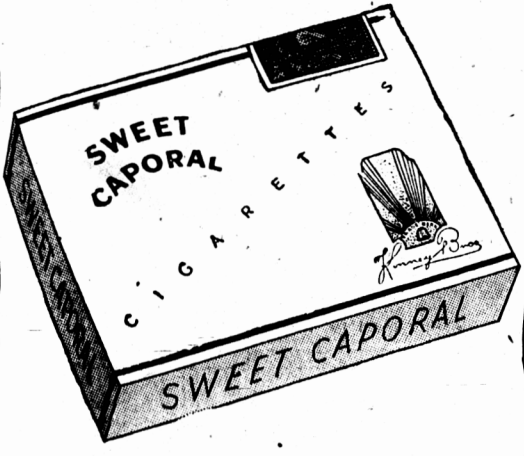

Detroit Red Wings In 7-1 Win Over Canadiens In Game Saturday Night

MONTREAL, Dec. 3 — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings ran wild Saturday night and overwhelmed Montreal Canadiens 7-1 before 14,478 stunned cash customers.

It was the worst losing Canadiens have taken this season and they slipped back into fourth slot in the National Hockey League standing, leaving Chicago alone in third place.

Jimmy Peters, Sid Abel and Jim McFadden each ran in two goals and Gage Stewart scored one. Peters, just about the best man on the ice, also had two assists to give him four scoring points for the night. Ted Lindsay was the pass-feeder on both goals scored by Abel.

Calum MacKay scored Canadiens' lone goal early in the second period on a passout from Floyd Curry. The play started on a pass from Gerry Desaulniers, playing his second game with Canadiens on lend-lease from Montreal Senior Royals.

The Wings ran in three goals in the opening period and another trio in the second.

Four of their goals came while they had a man advantage through penalties but they counted another while a man short themselves.

The helpless Habs were soon floundering. Each goalie handled 29 shots but Wings missed few chances, most of their goals coming from close range.

Canadiens drew only three of the 10 penalties called, one of them a major to Butch Bouchard for instigating a fight with Gordie Howe of Detroit.

NEW YORK 3, BOSTON 2

BOSTON, Dec. 3 — (AP) — New York Rangers scored a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over Boston before 8,303 fans Saturday to move into fifth place, two points ahead of the faltering Bruins.

It was the first Ranger victory of the season over Boston. Previously the clubs had played three ties and Boston had fashioned a 4-3 decision.

The Bruins even pulled Jack Gelineau from the Boston goal, sending six players onto the ice for 60 of the final 80 seconds in a vain attempt to tie the game.

Tony Leswick batted home Edgar Laprade's pass at 1:07 of the opener for the Rangers. After defenseman Ross Lowe's marker pulled Boston even at 4:54, former Bruin Zelio Toppazzini sent New York ahead 2-1 at 7:33.

His effort, on which Pat Egan and Eddie Kullman drew assists, was a sliding shot past Gelineau.

Buddy O'Connor scored Rangers' winning goal at 9:07 of the finale, Pentti Lund drawing an assist.

Boston's final goal was an unassisted blue-line shot at 16:21 by Bill Quackenbush who picked off a New York pass.

Dare Charles To Mix With Nick Barone

CINCINNATI, Dec. 2 — (AP) — Henry Andrews, who manages Nick Barone, declared yesterday heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles will be knocked out if he slugs with the boy from Syracuse in their title bout next Tuesday.

"We dare Charles to mix with Nick," Andrews said. "If he does, I know he won't be there at the end of the 15th. Barone, a heavy body puncher, will rip him to pieces if he doesn't run."

Andrews, who is handling a confident fighter, said Barone has boxed 70 rounds in preparation for next week's contest. He believes the upstate New Yorker is in better shape than the champion. He also believes Charles is easy to hit in the body, and that he cannot take too many punches around the stomach.

"Joe Louis hit him just once under the heart and buckled him," Andrews said. "He'll be hit more than once by Barone."

Charles, lean and confident, boxed seven rounds today. Other exercises were the equivalent of 14 rounds of work.

Jimmy Brown, the Champion's trainer, said Charles weighs 165 or 166 pounds, and will dry out to about 133 for the weigh-in.

"Charles is sharp... he's always in condition."

"We are just waiting for the bell."

The title contest was scheduled for Nov. 28, but was set back a week because of the blizzard.

Smythe Opposed To Rule Changes

TORONTO, Dec. 2 — (CP) — Frank Boucher's ideas for a couple of rule changes in the National Hockey League met with a poor reception today from Conn Smythe, general manager of Toronto Maple Leafs.

The New York Rangers' manager is urging a return of the 10-minute sudden-death overtime period and a change in the penalty rule to prevent a club from being two men short at one time.

Boucher believes such changes would help Rangers, who are tied with Boston Bruins in the N.H.L. cellar. The Manhattan club has registered only two victories and nine ties while losing 10.

"I think one of the greatest sights in hockey is seeing a short-handed club stop one at full strength from scoring," Smythe said. "If you have a team there is no need to complain."

The Leaf official said there is "no reason and no justification" for overtime.

Shotton Sour On Big Time Baseball

BARTOW, Fla., Dec. 2 — (AP) — Burt Shotton, deposed this week as Brooklyn manager in favor of Chuck Dressen, said today he was through with big time baseball.

"The deal I got this time made me a little sour," Shotton told Loyal Fribble of the Polk County Democrat.

A veteran of 42 years in baseball, Shotton said he might do "a few odd jobs" in the sport from time to time, but has no immediate plans.

Earlier Shotton told reporters he would reserve comment on his offer for the annual minor and major league meeting which gets under way in St. Petersburg Monday.
