## Ayrshire Breeders Plan Field Day And School

Prince Edward Island's Ayrshire breeders are planning for two days of unusual activity here the latter part of next week.

An Ayrshire judging school will be conducted at the Experimental Farm here on Friday, June 26, by John McCaig who is a classifier for Ayrshire cattle and one of the dairy breeders in the area.

The school is under the auspices of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders Association and some 40 men with judging experience, or who are regarded as likely prospects for future judging, will be invited from the three Maritime Provinces.

This will be the third judging school held in Canada by the Ayrshire breeders, it was learned.

The Island's Ayrshire breeders are planning a provincial field day on Saturday, June 27, at the farm of Wallace Wood, Marshfield which will feature a promotional sale of young breeding stock from most of the top Island breeders, in addition to the normal field day activities of judging classes, children's sports, etc.

The field day activity will get underway at 11 a.m. and the ladies of the Marshfield Women's Institute will serve dinner on the grounds.

The stock offered for sale will consist mainly of first or second lactation heifers, with the exceptions of one mature cow. They will have freshened or will freshen by September 1.

The animals will come from the herds of W. McCaig, South; Gavin Reid, Victoria Cross; James A. Kelly, Valleyfield; E. James and Sons, Mt. Herbert; George Boswell, Frenchfort; A. B. and F. T. MacRae, Union Road; A. McDeville, East Main; and Son, Brookfield and Belmont Wood and Son, Little York and Marshfield.

## Extension Is Favored By Lobster Fishermen

MONTAGUE — A unanimous vote in favor of the extension of the lobster season in the 7-B area was cast last night at the special meeting called by the southern Kings and Queens Fishermen's Association at Montague Regional High School. It was the opinion of the large gathering that other associations will support the request.

In the discussion on the motion it was agreed that less than half the amount of lobsters were caught this year in comparison with the previous year. Reasons given for such a poor catch in this area, which extends from Launching to Pinetree, the cold weather and time lost due to high winds.

It was pointed out that a strong plea was made to have the season set aside to May 10. Due to the late starting date, however, nothing had been done about it.

Following the voting on the motion a second resolution was introduced giving the local association the power to introduce a resolution to have the season for the area from May 10 to July 10. This motion carried unanimously.

It was also mentioned that considerable difference existed between the season results on the north side of the island and the area from East Point to Pinetree and that perhaps something should be done to have the areas split.

**CATCH IMPROVING**
