As there was no insurance on the building, and as Mr. McPherson's family consists of six or seven small children, besides himself and his wife, this charitable public should contribute liberally towards the erection of a house for them to live in for the winter. Mr. McPherson is a hardworking, industrious man and his case is a very sad one.
