LANDING OF TROOPS AT DAIGUIRI.

The Entire Army on Cuban Soil.

COAST TOWNS SHELLED AND SUBMARINE MINES CAPTURED.

Greatest Conflict of the War Now Imminent.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The American army has all been landed at Daquiri, fifteen miles below Santiago, and a cable station has been opened at Playa del Esti, which is half way from the point of debarkation to the city of Santiago.

Two cable messages were received yesterday afternoon by the officials here, which conveyed this information. They were from General Shafter and Admiral Sampson.

The former sends word of the successful landing of the entire army, and the latter reports the shelling of the coast towns, capturing ten submarine mines and rendering great service to Shafter's troops.

It is believed that the greatest conflict of the war is not many days off.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Sampson cables that while the troops were landing the Texas bombarded the Cabanas to engage the attention of the enemy, and that one man was killed on board the Texas.

Lord Rothschild, it is said, follows the Chinese plan of paying his physician only so long as his Lordship is in good health. Sir William Broadbent, the physician, receives \$5,000 per year if his patient's health is good throughout the period.

OUR FISHERIES JURISDICTION.

The Matter Mixed and Muddled

DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS

May Each License and Tax the Fishermen.

OTTAWA, June 23.—Although only representatives of the Dominion, and of Ontario and Quebec ports were present at the conference held here yesterday, the conclusions reached, based on the recent judgement of the Judicial Committee of Privy Council, are of far-reaching importance to all the provinces.

The decision largely disintegrates the Fisheries Department and the muddled question of jurisdiction. It was concluded at the meeting that, hereafter, the provinces had a right to issue licenses for fishing in indefinite locations, as for instance with pound nets. Fees will be collected and retainable by the provinces, but in addition the Dominion has a right to impose tax. Thus the effect may be that the provinces will still charge \$50 license fees for pound nets and then the Dominion will impose a tax of \$10 on each license.

How some of the provinces will collect the fee is a puzzle. If, as Davies contemplates, all the fishing officers on the inland waters are given their commissions, the local governments will have to create a small army of officers to carry out the law.

The protection of the fisheries on great lakes and seaboard will be continued by the Federal Government. The Dominion Government will also continue to control the salmon fishery of British Columbia. The deep sea fisheries of the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and of the lobster fishing; but the Maritime Provinces will have absolute control of the oyster fishing with power to issue licenses and licenses,—this class of fishing being defined as a fixed location.

FROM THE PHILIPPINES.

Reported Massacre of August's Children.

UNIVERSITY OF OTTAWA.

A Triple Medallist From P. E. Island.

DISTINCTION WON BY MR. THOMAS E. CULLEN.

The closing exercises of the University of Ottawa were held on Monday night with unusual eclat.

Rev. Dr. Fallon, vice rector, presided in the place of Rev. Dr. Constantineau, who sailed recently on a visit to Europe.

Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Aberdeen and suite, Archbishop Duhamel, several members of the Federal Cabinet, Mayor Byham, and over 800 other representatives of Ottawa society, were present in the Academy Hall of the University to assist at the exercises.

Sir W. Hingston, M. D., of Montreal, delivered the oration.

The University glee club of 100 voices, accompanied by an orchestra of 15 pieces, rendered "The Cantata" during the evening.

Among the recipients of honors from the faculty of the university was Mr. Thomas E. Cullen, son of Mr. Patrick Cullen, of Charlottetown. Mr. Cullen has the distinction of being a triple medallist, an honor won only once in the last fifteen years.

Besides receiving the degree of B. Ph. cum summa laude, Mr. Cullen captured the Governor General's silver medal in the University course, the Chancellor's gold medal in the English course, and the University silver medal, awarded to the highest average among the medallists of the University.

Mr. Cullen's average was 95 3-5. The Island has been, especially fortunate in her representatives at this flourishing institution. All have been talented men and hard students, and consequently they have established for the Island an enviable reputation.

A striking feature of the evening's programme was the Varsity cheer lustily given from 450 student throats, as each for an unate medallist ascended to receive his reward.

The University closes now to reopen September 8.
