# MARKETS

New York Stocks

U.S. Steel

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The stock market ran into sharp selling trouble last week, but a moderate recovery took the sting out of the decline.

The fall in the first two sessions last week came against a background of a new federal policy of tighter credit and was not unexpected in financial circles.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 50 cents on the week at \$171.90. The record peak came July 27 at \$177.00.

The most active issues on the New York stock exchange were: Callahan Zinc up 1/2 at 6 1/2 on 127,000 shares; U. S. Steel unchanged at 52 1/2; Sperry Rand off 1/4 at 25 and Westinghouse Electric off 1/4 at 64.

Canadian stocks were mostly lower. Dom. Mines gained 1/4 at 15 1/2 but International Nickel lost 1/4 at 77. Canadian Pacific was down 1/4 at 33 1/2. Hiram Walker was off 1/4 at 73 1/2 and Distillers Seagram declined 1/4 at 38 1/2.

On the American exchange Lake Shore was off 1/4 at 5 1/2, Giant Yellowknife declined 3-16 at 6 1/2 and Royalite Oil was unchanged at 14 1/2.

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—An ultimate reduction in demand for steel may nullify if the government's move to tighten credit is effective, says Steel, the metal-working weekly.

Producers are watching steel inventories for clues to demand for the metal during the next several months and are studying ways to reduce inventory build-up during periods of high unemployment.

Steel says the inventory buildup is not alarming at this point but what producers are watching for is a "big push" in the metal industry has come about not so much because of a reduction in consumption but because of increased shipments of the metal from mills.

Steel says that although the automobile industry—largest steel user—is in a seasonal downturn in production, it is not making any important cancellations in steel orders.

**PRODUCTION STEADY**—Steel production held steady at 90 per cent of rated capacity last week. This compared with the second quarter average of 95.2 per cent. The magazine attributed the downturn to vacations, forced repairs of furnaces and labor troubles.

Sustained domestic demand for steel and an export demand for scrap pushed Steel's price composite on steelmaking grades of scrap up to \$44.17 a gross ton. This is the highest since mid-August of 1953 and an advance of \$1 over the previous week. Other prices are stable, though the price composite on finished steel at \$127.41 a net ton.

## 200 Persons Hot On Trail Of Fortune

**TORONTO (CP)**—Some 200 persons, hot on the trail of a fortune, have answered a call for blood relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Coplin Cox who left \$1,600,000 without known heirs.

Replies to the plea for relatives of the insurance company executive who died in 1947, and his widow who died in 1948, have arrived from all 10 provinces and from as far away as California.

Officials of the Toronto law firm of McCarthy and McCarthy who advertised for heirs, said that replies are still coming in. Letters from a dozen more hopefuls reached their office Tuesday.

Mr. Cox, former head of Canada Life Assurance Co., willed his money into a trust fund for its employees, but this clause was thrown out in court.

A big share of the fortune will go in succession duties but the rest will be split among the nearest relatives by the courts some time after September.

# Bank Deposits Reflect The Booming Canadian Economy

**OTTAWA (CP)**—Reflecting the booming Canadian economy deposits in chartered banks rose by more than \$1,200,000,000 over a 12-month period to \$10,273,000,000 on Aug. 3.

And to help of the boom, the banks' loans and investments increased in that period by roughly an equivalent amount, to some \$9,200,000,000. This latter figure covers bank investments in government and corporation securities, mortgages and various loans including day-to-day loans.

However, the ratio of the banks' cash reserves to deposits has shown a tendency to decline in recent weeks to the legal minimum of eight per cent.

Chartered bank statistics gathered by the Bank of Canada showed that the banks' cash reserves averaged 6.7 per cent for the Aug. 1-3 period. This compared with an 8.3 per cent average for all July and 8.9 per cent for August last year.

**RESERVE FLUCTUATE**—Under the new minimum approved by Parliament, the banks' cash reserves are allowed to fluctuate providing they average at least eight per cent over the month.

On Aug. 5 the Bank of Canada moved to tighten credit by boosting its lending charges to chartered banks to two per cent from 1 1/2. While in practice the banks do not borrow much money from the central agency, the move was an announcement to the money market generally that it will have to face higher charges if it has to borrow from the central agency.

**A BRAKE ON CREDIT**—It also served as a hint to the financial houses that federal authorities feel the rate of rise in credit extension is becoming too steep for the country
