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Meteors Take Over 2nd Place In League; Win 8-6 From Souris Tigers

Montague Meteors took over second place in the King's County Hockey League by defeating the Souris Tigers 8-6 in a regular feature at Montague last night.

Lacking the services of their star defenceman, "Buddy" McCormac, out with an injured foot, the visitors nevertheless put up a strong attack and took over control of the first period. Their fast forwards whipped at the Meteors from all sides, keeping the attack in the Montague zone for the greater part of the period, scoring four goals to Montague's three. Young Don Stewart, in the Meteor net for the first time, stopped the onrushing attack time after time and turned in an excellent performance.

The Meteors began steam rolling in the second period, and hemmed the Tigers around their own net throughout most of the 20 minutes. Pierce, Souris goalie, rose to stellar heights in a crowd-thrilling performance as he stopped the Meteors attack, handling four to five shots in quick succession. But the locals were not to be denied, and under the constant pressure he allowed three goals, with Souris getting only one return.

The last period was almost a repetition of the second as the Meteors continued to hem in the Tigers in gang attacks out of which they scored two more. With still plenty of fight left, the Tigers came back in the last five minutes to press home an attack which netted them one goal, and several near misses. MacPhee for Souris and MacLean for Montague were top goal-getters with three

each, and Power and Nelson for the Meteors with two assists and one goal had the same number of points.

Long Distance Tolls "The long distance toll charges will be increased, but not in all cases and considering the size of this Province and therefore the shortness of the toll lines and the volume of business transacted over the lines, the rates are fair in comparison with those in effect elsewhere.

"The rates as found in the original application set forth a rate for dial service in the group applying to the Charlottetown Exchange but as dial service is not yet available the Commission informed the Company that it would refuse to consider the granting of a rate for dial service until the same becomes effective. Following this intimation an interim rate was applied for to be effective pending the installation of dial equipment.

"Although the service in the Charlottetown Exchange as above mentioned is far from satisfactory, the Commission, for the reasons above given, will approve an interim rate above the existing rate to be effective only until the establishment of adequate dial service. When the dial service has been established a rate as set out

in the schedule will then become effective substantially higher because of the great capital expenditure which will be involved in establishing the service."

"The Commission and the Company have long been aware of the insufficiency of service in the Charlottetown Exchange and the Company proposed an expansion of the present manual system which, if acted upon, would have automatically been followed by a substantial rate increase due to the great capital expenditure necessitated thereby, and which would be followed by further increases as large additional capital investments were made.

"At the time it was the opinion of the Commission that in the best interest of the subscribers the greatest long term economy could be effected by permitting the existing equipment to reach its maximum point of depreciation before replacement. The point has now been reached when the old equipment can be replaced at a minimum loss to the subscriber and preparation is now being made for dial service. We feel that, apart altogether from the necessity of having our service in line with advancing times, the course being followed is in the best interests of sound economy and therefore of the subscribers of the exchange generally."

"Now it is common knowledge that recently the interest rates have sharply risen and Col. J.R. Paton, the local manager of Royal Securities Limited, corroborated the evidence of Company's witnesses that it was quite reasonable to estimate the interest rate of a bond issue at 4-1-2 per cent and a 5 per cent return on preferred stock.

"With the cost of capital found to be thus no further proof is required that the Company's present rate of return would not at all attract the attention of the investing public. Hence, an increase in the rate of return is imperative, and without determining the maximum percentage of return on earnings base, we do not think the rate of return which the Company claims will result from the proposed schedule is excessive.

Not Satisfactory "Of those appearing at the hearing on behalf of various parties, no one seriously contended that an upward revision of rates was not warranted but whether or not the words used were apt they left no doubt with the Commission that the service being rendered was not at all satisfactory and it was contended that a rate increase should only be effective on the establishment of satisfactory service. Now there is no lack of authority to say that rates follow service and that the kind and quality of service being rendered must be given consideration in a rate fixing case, but we are satisfied that the adequacy and efficiency of telephone service in this Province not only cannot be improved but cannot even be maintained as at present on the revenues furnished through ex-

isting rates. Not only does the Company require additional revenue to keep pace with the ever increasing operational costs but, as above mentioned, large capital expenditures must be made to increase and improve facilities for service.

"The Company in its position claims that while the general operational expenses rose by 189.77% from 1939 to 1950, the percentage of increase in taxation rose in the same period by 377.15%. And since the taking of evidence in the case under the Old Age Security Act discloses that a further tax amounting to more than one dollar per subscriber will be levied for the year 1952.

"So rapidly are construction and operational costs increasing because of inflation that further returns on rate structure cannot be predicted with any degree of certainty but, in our opinion, based on the evidence adduced and analyzed by our consultants, the proposed rates in general will not yield an excessive revenue to the Company. However, we feel that certain changes and modifications should be made in the proposed rates and schedules."
