Ellen Reads To James "Grandpa's Windmill"

"I just don't know how the younger generations will turn out," James commented, seriously by this evening, looking back then along his day. "Not that they're not smart, and knowing, and interested too in their work, but compared with our childhood, it seems that things come too easily to the children of now. For example: they want a drink of water. There's no labor to getting it — no pumping or going to the spring or brook, no toting a pail. A turn of a tap — that's all! A touch and they have light, as taken-for-granted nowadays as though it were sunlight or shower. And if they have to go as far as the back field. . . . "Or the mailbox" we chuckled. . . . they take the tractor or car or bicycle. They never think of walking the distance. It's too much they have for their own good. I'm thinking. . . . he nodded obviously amazed at the thought of their indulgences. "They have and they haven't," he offered. "It's an era of living. And if there's a gain to them in it there is also a loss. It's a coincidence, but there is an article along that line in one of today's farm-papers. You must read it" we said.

"No," James said cuddling down in the old armchair. "After a day at the harvest, I feel more like listening. Ellen. You find it and read it to me."

The bride was escorted into the church by her brother, Peter Jackman of Sudbury.

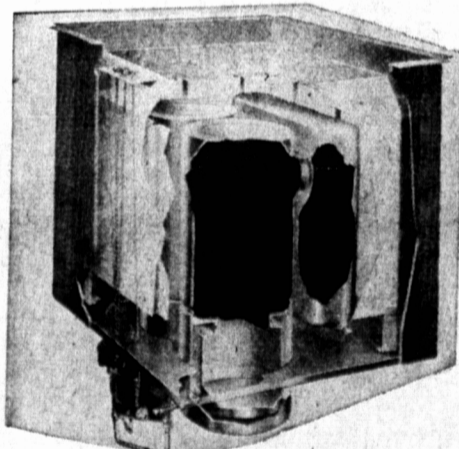
