SUPREME COURT.—Yesterday the Chief Justice relieved the petit jury from duty until the 27th inst., with the injunction that they should then meet to finish the important business of the present session. To-day the Court is engaged in hearing appeals and arguments, and will this evening adjourn to attend the session of the Supreme Court in Georgetown.

BLANK FORMS of entries for annual matches of the Dominion Rifle Association are now sent out from Ottawa. Formerly entries were not made till competitors arrived, and a good deal of confusion and delay naturally resulted. The new practice is the one in vogue in Wimbledon. The Governor General and Princess Louise will be present at the opening of the meeting.

CAMPBELLTON.—Rev. Mr. Tippet, Methodist Minister, closed his engagement at Campbellton last Sunday evening. He preached his farewell sermon before a crowded congregation. He was active in Temperance and Sabbath-School work, and a prominent member of the Y. M. C. A. During his stay in the north he has succeeded in building a Church in Bellefleur, and raised the Church in Campbellton to a state of independence. Mr. Tippet's new circuit is in Charlottetown, for which city he started this week, being in Moncton en route.—Moncton Times.

THE BELLEVUE MINE.—The annual meeting of the Bellevue Albertite and Oil Company took place at the mine on the 13th inst. In the shaft they are supposed to be within 9 feet of a deposit now; a pipe from the hole made by the borer supplies a gas jet incessantly with pure gas. The cost of the repairs on account of the late fire is \$300. After inspecting the working of the mine, the stockholders assembled and proceeded with the sale of delinquent stock. After the sale the Sec. Treasurer stated that the present liabilities of the Company to be \$1,700, but there was stock yet to realize on to the value of \$3,000, which, when disposed of, would leave the Company with a balance to their credit of \$1,300. The following directors were elected for the ensuing year: Blair Botsford, F. W. Hales, Duncan S. Harper, William Patrick, E. B. Chandler, Matthew Lindsay and William Esson. Warden Botsford did not wish to continue as President, and Matthew Lindsay was elected to that position by the directors. E. B. Chandler was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

THE CENTENARY WELCOME: ITS NEW PANTON.—A most brilliant collation was prepared by the ladies of the Centenary Methodist Church last evening, it being the occasion of a reception, which was made a joyous one, to Rev. D. D. Currie, who is to assume the pastorate of the church. The congregation assembled in force and indulged in a friendly intercourse at the proper time during the evening. Judge Palmer was called to the chair and made some appropriate opening remarks. At the conclusion, Rev. Mr. Currie addressed the meeting, and gave an interesting sketch of the history of the Centenary Church. Rev. Mr. Daniel also made some remarks in connection with the church and its new pastor. After the intellectual part of the programme was concluded, all present were regaled with refreshments gotten up by the ladies in excellent style. NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

NEW YORK, July 12.

The wife of Policeman Norris, convicted of procuring an abortion on Maud Bishop, of Prince Edward Island, was to-day sentenced to three years in prison.

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, July 15. News has been received of a difficulty between the military and police at Monterey. One officer and two policemen are reported killed.

BRADFORD, PA., July 15.

Last night 25,000 barrels in an iron tank of oil, belonging to the united pipe lines at Custer City, were struck by lightning. It is feared that the burning fluid will be carried through the city on the Tuna Creek. A big tank at Kansas branch was also struck. Custer City is only a few miles from Bradford, and is in danger of being destroyed by fire. Men are at work throwing up trenches. A tank containing 25,000 barrels on Lewis Run was also struck. Three distinct fires are raging. Big and small tanks were burned on Lewis Run.

SANTA FE, July 15.

At Lincoln, N. M., on the 3rd, a young man named Harrison came into the town and, becoming intoxicated, was locked up at night. A mob entered the jail and killed Harrison. Next night the mob killed the deputy sheriff, who was implicated in the killing of the night before, and had made himself obnoxious to the outlaws. On the night of the 5th the mob visited the jail, taking out and hanging a prisoner. It is not known what the prisoner's crimes were.

LONDON, July 15.

An explosion occurred this morning in the London and South Wales Colliery Company, at the new black vein pit at Risca, six miles from Newport. It is supposed that 119 men were in the pit at the time. Probably none will be saved. One body was found at the bottom of the shaft. Ventilation is being restored in the mine to explore for the bodies.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.

Private advices report that Chung How has been liberated and degraded from the first to the fourth rank by the Mandarin. Nevertheless, the war party is in the ascendant.

DUBLIN, July 15.

The reports of fever in some parts of Mayo are much exaggerated. It is ordinary typhus and the deaths are very few.

LONDON, July 15.

Rev. Alexander Mackenzie has lodged an appeal in the Lords against the order suspending him.

The Times says, to-day, that a collective note will be presented to the Porte.

Bullion in the Bank of England has decreased £91,000 during the week. The proportion of its reserve to its liability, which last week was 50 3-16 per cent, is now 51 7-16.

ROME, July 15.

At the municipal elections in Vicenza, the clericals returned a majority of candidates, also at Venice. In the Deputies, provisions to meet any deficit which the abolition of the grist tax may occasion, have been voted.

NEW YORK, July 16—2 a. m.

Bail for Patchell was not accepted in yesterday's examinations, which are to be continued.

Marion, aged 18, daughter of Rev. James Baird, D. D., formerly of St. John, had a dispute with her mother about a legacy or some family matter. The girl left her home a day or two and it was feared she was lost or had destroyed herself. She has been found by Mrs. Reed, a friend of the family, at White Plains, New York, and restored to her family.

PANAMA, July 15.

Advices from South America are that Peru and Bolivia are about to enter into a confederation as one country under one flag, to be known as the United States of Peru and Bolivia. The preliminary bases of union have been signed at Lima, by representatives of both countries and laid before the Council of the State of Peru. After the capture of Arica, the city was given up to Chilean soldiers and their orgies ended in burning it to the ground, not a house being left. Fortunately hundreds of women and children were taken on board the foreign men-of-war in their port.

NEW YORK, July 15.

A letter from Santiago de Cuba confirms the massacre of Cuban prisoners by Spaniards. The unfortunate patriots were on the plantation of Dr. Torres, near Santiago de Cuba. Some of them were very ill and were nursed by companions. A spy gave information of their presence to the Spanish commandant and a detachment of soldiers surrounded the planter's house at night. The entire party was captured, and the butchery began immediately after, each one, including the owner of the plantation, being shot down in cold blood.

LONDON, July 15.

The Cardiff correspondent of the Press Association telegraphs that there is some confusion regarding the number of men in the pit. Recent calculation lessens it to 80, but it is not impossible that there were over 200 colliers.

LATER.—It is now certain that 119 persons perished in Risco Colliery. It is impossible to say when the bodies can be safely reached.

DANVILLE, Va., July 16.

Mollie De Jarnette, who was shot by her brother in a respectable house last Thursday, died this evening. The brother is in jail waiting trial.

PARIS, July 15.

Rochefer's new journal sold 198,000 copies yesterday.
