The new steamer Premier sailed last night from Ayr for Halifax. She is in charge of Capt. M. Allen, and will be due here 16th or 17th. Capt. Allen has been in Scotland for several months, overlooking the construction and finishing of the vessel. The Premier is classed 100 A 1 at Lloyds and has an English board of trade certificate for passengers. She is of considerable power, her boiler being 13 feet diameter and 104 feet long; her speed is 11 1/2 knots on a consumption of 8 to 10 tons coal per 25 hours. Certain important changes have recently been made by the provisional directors of the company, in the route to be run by the Premier, and Capt. A. H. Kelly is to be in permanent command.—Halifax Herald.

Watching Blood Indians

FORT MCELROY, Alberta, August 4.—The mounted police are watching at the international boundary adjacent to Montana to prevent Canadian Blood Indians from crossing into the Dominion with Winchester ammunition, purchased at Outbanks, Montana. Although the reds are not allowed to buy it in Canada, the government will not compel them to give up cartridges once they are found in their possession on Canadian territory. The only safeguard is to take it from them at the boundary on the ground that the ammunition is being smuggled in without payment of duty. The law is a strange one. While it prohibits Indians from buying, it does not authorize the police to recover it, unless actual smuggling has taken place. The government has no reason to suspect the intentions of the Indians, but they are one of the most powerful and warlike tribes in the Northwest.

Laborers in the North-West.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 4.—A report from the North-West appearing in Ontario papers that thousands of men are unable to obtain employment is falsified. Out of 500 men who arrived in Winnipeg last Friday not 50 remain unemployed. Harvesting will be general in a week or ten days and within the next week there will be work for 4,000 men.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Adrift Without Food.

MOSCOW, Aug. 6.—Thomas McClay, and James Chisholm, from the Gloucester fishing schooner Willie M. Stevens, arrived here this morning from Caraque. The men were cast away in a dory off the banks of Cape Breton, on July 26, and drifted about without food or drink, suffering terribly until July 31st, when they were picked up by an English vessel. The American Consul sent them home.

A Sad Story.

HALIFAX Aug. 6.—A sailor named Wilkins, a stowaway in the steamer Mandale from England, was found dead on the wharf at Pictou this morning. It is said that the man was made to work when not fit; that he was kept days without food, and cast off without pay, and that last night he begged for God's sake to be taken aboard, but was refused.

Railway Disaster.

STRAUSSE, Aug. 6.—A freight train, on south shore, broke in two, and the express train dashed into the rear portion. The fireman and ten Italian immigrants were killed. The engineer and many passengers were injured, many of whom will die. The sleeping car was burned, but all the passengers escaped.

The Maritime Forrester.

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 6.—At this morning's meeting of the High Court of Forrester, it was decided to obtain new charters for the united courts of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. J. T. Hawke, editor of the Moncton Transcript, was appointed associate editor of the Forrester for the Maritime Provinces.

Negotiations for Joint Action.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—England and France are negotiating for joint action for the protection of their subjects in China. Germany may join them.
