Weather Snaps Spinnaker Joe

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—De-fended Weatherly snapped his spinnaker pole at the last leg of Tuesday's second race for the America's Cup and the American sloop was fully re-covered, skipper Emil (Bud) Mosbacher said Tuesday night.

Expanding Weatherly's, until pricing loss to the Australian challenger, Gretel, Mosbacher said the accident happened shortly after turning the last mark and it took five minutes to repair the damage.

A new pole, a 17-foot aluminum shaft was put up but the spinnaker was drawn satisfactorily, the skipper said.

Asked by reporters at the post-race conference if Weatherly might have won if the accident hadn't happened, Mosbacher replied: "I would not know."

Gretel had taken the lead after rounding the final mark and Weatherly was attempting to move in when, according to the skipper, the spinnaker pole wrapped around the jib stay and snapped.

Mosbacher turned up as the surprise spokesman for the Weatherly crew in a race of George O'Day, who had been serving as the intermediary.

The skipper said O'Day, who also was present at the conference, would continue as spokesman for the Americans but would discontinue his side activities as a writer.

115-Mile-Per-Hour Carriers Envisioned By U.S. Admiral

WASHINGTON (AP)—Small aircraft carriers which would cruise along just above the surface of the water at speeds of 115 miles an hour are envisioned by a United States admiral.

TO SUSPEND HELIP

Lengthy Grafting Operations Performed By Gaspe Doctor

QUEBEC (CP)—Le Soleil says it has learned of two lengthy grafting operations in a small Gaspe Peninsula hospital that saved the arm of a girl and the arm of a man, severed in separate accidents.

Both operations were performed by Dr. Maurice Safai of the Notre-Dame de Charvres hospital in Maria, about 85 miles south of Gaspe.

The first operation, Aug. 19, was performed by Eva Lagace of Lachine, Que., whose left arm was severed in an accident at Caplan, near Maria. The graft was below the elbow joint.

Dr. Safai said later complete recovery may take a long time, but he was encouraged by the fact that the child had returned to the arms of both patients.

The patients have been transferred to Maisonneuve Hospital in Montreal, the newspaper said.

Plaque To Mark McIntosh Apple

WILLIAMSBURG, Ont. (CP) John McIntosh, the United Empire Loyalist settler who developed the apple variety bearing his name, will be remembered Saturday with the unveiling of a plaque on his old farm near here.

The plaque was prepared by the Ontario Archaeological and Historical Sites Board and will be unveiled by Ontario Municipal Affairs Minister Fred Cass and Dr. A. M. Macdonald, a great-grandson of John McIntosh.

McIntosh settled six miles west of here in 1796 after emigrating from the United States. Williamsburg is 45 miles southwest of Ontario.

There is no question that the majority of declarers have difficulty visualizing an end-play situation that will not arise until five or perhaps ten tricks after the opening lead is made.

However, the expert player calmly jumps the trick, seemingly without thought, accepting as routine the intermediate play situation to be used in the end play.

For example, take this hand where the contract is five clubs and West leads a heart. South
