and succession duties turned over to the Dominion under the 1947 Tax Agreement.
"While reports from the taxation statistics of the Dominion Government indicate that for the taxation year 1948, \$2,550,139.00 was collected in Prince Edward Island by the Federal Government from those sources, or \$752,458.00 more than we received, nevertheless we as a Province could not hope to collect more than a fraction of that amount, especially where the Dominion collects such taxes in any event.

"That we have been able to maintain the standard of public services during the current fiscal year ending March 31st, 1950, and even to expand in certain particulars, has been due to a most careful handling of the public finance, the continued high level of current revenue, and the increased receipts under the Taxation Agreement based on gross national product."

Interim Statement

Dealing with the Interim Statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year April 1, 1949, to March 31, 1950, consisting of ten months actual and two months forecast, Mr. Darby said the estimated receipts reflected the prosperity of this Province and the wisdom of the Government in leasing certain taxation powers to the Dominion under the favourable terms then obtained. The statement showed that ordinary revenues have again increased to a new high of \$6,351,996.00.

A New High

Ordinary revenues during the current year again reached a new high of \$6,351,996, compared with \$5,688,162 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1949—an increase of \$663,834. This additional income was mainly derived as follows: Under the Dominion-Provincial Agreement, due to increased gross national product (\$536,154 to \$356,613) \$179,541; increased Dominion contribution for old age and blind pensions (\$920,013 to \$623,999) \$296,014.

Health Services

"The expansion of Health and Welfare services during the earlier years has already been noted. In 1934 we expended \$243,000, growing to \$1,400,000 in 1948, to \$1,733,023 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1949 and for the current fiscal year attaining a grand total of \$2,255,979, or \$60,000 more than the whole Provincial expenditure for the year 1939. The estimates for next year will be approximately \$2,500,000.

Capital Account

"During this year capital and extraordinary expenditures were \$2,124,198, and capital receipts \$39,660, together with \$94,000 interest on sinking fund investments. Total expenditure, ordinary and capital, was \$2,190,538, as against total revenue of \$5,515,658.00, leaving a gross deficit of \$1,774,723.00. Deducting sinking fund provision, \$432,190.00, and adding interest of \$64,000.00 leaves a total of \$466,190.00, or a net increase in liabilities of \$1,278,533.00. The net debt as of March 31, 1949, was \$12,873,032.00; adding the

United Church Increases Missionary Givings

For the ninth year in succession, the United Church of Canada has exceeded its previous years' Missionary and Maintenance Fund givings, it was announced by Mr. A. E. McBride of Toronto, national chairman and Rev. Dr. D. G. Ridout, national secretary. With a total of \$2,706,206 raised for the Church's work in Canada and overseas, an increase of \$165,495, over the previous year's givings is shown. The objective for the whole Church for 1950 when the Church celebrates its twenty-fifth Anniversary, is three million dollars.

"It will be the policy of this Government to continue expenditures on a similar basis over a five or six year period until the Trans-Canada Highway in the Province is completed. It is our belief that this program will meet with the general approval of all our people.

"Another function of this Department is the maintenance of our public buildings and the construction of new or expansion of existing structures. During the present year the capital cost of these amounted to \$289,000, including additions to Beach Grove, Falconwood, the Vocational School and a new Health Centre.

Agriculture

"The expenditures in the Department of Agriculture reflect the increasing concern of our Government regarding a proper development of this, our most important industry. Field supervision has been extended, and the additional services are reflected in the increased cost at \$100,156 as compared with \$18,054 for the previous year. The agricultural pathologists' laboratory, a service inaugurated by this Government, involved an expenditure of \$19,122, \$4,000 from the year before. Encouragement of the good work done by the Women's Institutes is evidenced by additional assistance of over \$3,600.

Industry & Resources

"This new Department, set up by the Government within the last year and a half, has under its administration: Newfoundland trade, town planning, fisheries, game, transportation, electrical inspection and industrial development.
