THE RACES HELD AT SUMMERSIDE. Cricket and Baseball at the Park - Picnics Postponed.

The bicycle races were sandwiched in between the heats of the horse races, the first being the three mile race for the Championship of the Province and a silver cup offered by Godkin Bros, Summerside. There were only two starters, F. H. Cannon, St. Eleanor's, and B. C. Prowse of Charlottetown. Just before the race was called Mr. Prowse had the misfortune to injure the rear tire of his wheel, which prevented its further use, and he was obliged to ride a wheel on which he never sat before and with the management of which he was unacquainted. At the start Cannon led and set a slow pace, with Prowse at his wheel. This order was maintained for the greater part of the race. Towards the close of the last lap, however, each put on a splendid spurt, and Cannon passed under the wire the winner by about six yards in 9:47.

There were four starters in the mile race, F. H. Cannon, St. Eleanor's, B. C. Prowse, Charlottetown, A. D. Caldwell, Summerside, and A. E. Arsenault, Charlottetown. Caldwell led at the start, followed by Cannon, Prowse and Arsenault, in the order named, made payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to five per cent, or the amount of the tender, which will be forfeited if the party declines to enter into a contract when called upon to do so, or if he fails to supply the coal contracted for. If the tender is not accepted, the cheque will be returned.
