Anniversary Items.

MONDAY, Sept. 15.—Our Railway men should, this day, call to mind the first efforts at railroading, so far back as 1830, when the Liverpool and Manchester Railway was opened, and while they are contemplating with pride and satisfaction the vast extension of railway travel all over the world, and listening to the iron-horse running so smoothly over our own roads, should remember that, by an accident at that time and place and manner, the world lost one of its greatest statesmen and political economists. William Huskisson, M. P., who was present at the taking of the train, on July 14th, 1791, and saved the life of M. de Champepenniz, Governor of the Taileries (Aug. 10, 1792) and obtained the friendship of Canning (1791), on this day (1791) fifty-four years ago, fell a victim to an accident, the result of his great but unguarded interest in the development of travel by steam.
