THE brig "Zinga," Sheehan master, sailed for London, G. B., on the 11th inst., with the following cargo: 9327 boxes lobsters and 50 boxes mackerel, shipped by John Hughes; 1900 boxes lobsters, by Daniel Davies; 1656 boxes lobsters, by Shedd, Moore & Co; 175 boxes lobsters, by Harper & Webster; 2850 pieces deals and ends, containing 75,000 feet sap, measurement, by Peake Bros. & Co.

THE tank at the head of Queen street, which collapsed last fall, has been rebuilt by Messrs. McGuirk and Connors, under the inspection of A. N. Large, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Fire Department. It was filled with water by Rollo Engine, last evening, and the fact that the water up to the present has not lowered the eighth part of an inch, proves that the tank is water tight, and is, therefore, a creditable job to all concerned.

THE brig "Lionel," McLean, master, owned by Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co., on passage from Plymouth to this port with a cargo of limestone, yesterday morning, struck Heron Rock, off Arichat, while sailing in a thick fog. Her position at first was not thought to be dangerous, but yesterday she slipped off and sank ten feet under water. James Peake, Esq., and Capt. Carew left in the "Edgar Stuart" yesterday for the scene of the wreck, but it is now thought that the vessel will be a total loss.

THE Methodist S. S. Tea came off yesterday notwithstanding the unfavorable weather. The children eight hundred in number, enjoyed themselves very well, the afternoon having gradually cleared, and returned home in good order about 7.30. Mr. Carter deserves great credit for the manner in which the visitors tables were provided. Everything was in A 1 style, and all who partook, thought it very creditable. We hope he will continue to receive the patronage on such occasions.

THE nomination for Argenteuil took place on the 9th at Lachute. Hon. Mr. Abbott, lately unseated, and Dr. Christie (Grit) were nominated. Up to the present time little interest has been taken in the election. It was not until the last moment that the Grits decided to put a candidate in the field. Some time ago Dr. Christie positively declined to face the music. Now that a contest is to take place matters will become livelier, and it is probable that some outside oratorical talent will be imported. The election will take place on Thursday of next week.

A \$55,000 HAUL.—NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Forty thousand dollars worth of securities were missed from the safe of J. C. Wolcott & Co., of Broad Street. They were stolen on Friday by a young clerk, A. D. Wheelock, who was left alone to close up the business of the day. He also filled out three checks already signed by the firm, drew \$5,000 on one from the Continental Bank, and obtained on others letters of credit to the amount of \$10,000 on foreign bankers. The letters are negotiable in any part of the world where first-class banking houses exist. A description of the stolen securities has been telegraphed throughout the country. Wolcott & Co. are brokers.

SALE OF A SPEEDY YOUNG TROTTER.—The sale of the trotting mare Fanny Witherspoon to W. R. Armstrong, of Almont, Mich., for \$10,000, is announced. Fanny Witherspoon is a chestnut mare with a light stripe in her face and white to the ankle on her left hind leg, and stands sixteen and a quarter hands high. She was bred by Horace Witherspoon, of Lawrenceburg, Ky., and was foaled in 1874, her sire being Almont and her dam Lizzie Witherspoon, by the thoroughbred horse Gough W. gner, by old Wagner. Although a big mare, weighing about 1,100 pounds in condition, it is a remarkable fact that she carries less weight than any other trotter of note in America, her foreshoes weighing but nine ounces each, and her hind ones seven. Her record is 2:19, made at Buffalo on Friday last. In the heat in which she acquired it she was privately timed from the half-mile pole to the wire in 1:07.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.

The session of the Irish Convention has been little more than a prolonged wrangle. Investigation as to the qualifications of members being concluded, a committee was appointed to investigate finances. Their inquiry develops the fact that a clique of politicians are in control of the funds. The finance committee appointed by this meeting interrogated John Devoy, who is one of the trustees of the skirmishing fund, and also trustee of the Clan na Gael fund. He refuses point blank to make any statement, and the other trustees join in his refusal. The charges are that the conduct of the trustees has been most scandalous, and that they have appropriated money to improper uses. The fund alleged to have been squandered is composed of \$200,000 collected by the Clan na Gaels and \$92,000 skirmishing fund.

St. Louis, Aug. 10.

At the threshing boiler explosion yesterday the following were killed: Joshua Morgan, Christian Diehl, Fred. Batchelder, Nathan Brown, Alfred Arnold (colored), and a man known only by the name Charley. Conrad Lindermann, the engineer, George Storm and Henry Diehl were mortally wounded and two or three others slightly injured.

Pittsburg, Aug. 10.

Shorty O'Connor and Beddy Vasey, two of the McKeesport bandits, gave themselves up to the authorities at Hollidaysburg, Pa., this morning. They will be brought to this city to answer to a charge of robbery and murder. The whereabouts of the others is still unknown.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 10.

The wife of ex-President Fillmore (deceased) is dangerously ill from the effects of a second stroke of paralysis.

Chicago, Aug. 10.

Gen. O. H. Browning, formerly Secretary of the Interior in President Johnson's cabinet, is reported dying at Quincy, Ill.

EUROPEAN.

Dublin, Aug. 10.

The rector and other respectable inhabitants of Tipperary who did not illuminate in honor of John Dillon's release had their windows smashed by a mob.

London, Aug. 10.

John Dillon will probably come to London to participate in the debate on Parnell's motion censuring the Irish executive in regard to the administration of the Coercion Act.

London, Aug. 10.

A tele gram received at the foreign office announces the release of the correspondent of the News at Merve and his arrival at Meshed, escorted by thirty Turcoman horsemen.

London, Aug. 10.

Grevy, a large village in the canton of Grisons, Switzerland, has been destroyed by fire.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.

General Ewinroth, writing to the Nedomosi complaining of the attacks of the press, admits that extraordinary measures were taken during the recent elections in Bulgaria, due to his orders, but maintaining they were in accordance with the constitution. He says the only declaration of military law, namely, at Plevna and Rahova, was his own personal act, and was approved by the council. He claims that no pressure was exercised upon the electors, and that the only steps taken were to induce the peasantry not to abstain from voting and to prevent intimidation by agitators.
