HURRICANE IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Several Ocean Steamers in Peril.

DAMAGE TO SHIPPING AND SMALL CRAFTS.

Three Men and a Woman Drowned—Other Casualties Feared.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. Sept. 16.—A violent hurricane swept this section of Newfoundland last night. The Allen liner Corean, from Philadelphia, Pa., had a frightful passage and the Silvia from New York was delayed 24 hours.

Four fishing boats were driven off St. John's coast and three men and a woman drowned. A widespread destruction of fishing premises and gear is reported, and it is feared that there is much damage and probably loss of life at more distant ports.

Arctic Exploration.

SYDNEY, Cape Breton, Sept. 15.—The Peary Arctic Club's chartered steamer Diana arrived here today from Etah, North Greenland, Aug 28th, with all well on board. Lieutenant Peary and his two companions, with native allies, were left in excellent health and spirits, comfortably housed for the winter, with provisions for two years, and an ample supply of dog food, 111 walrus having been killed since Aug 2nd for that purpose.

Peary will remain at Etah until February, when, with a sporting party of natives, he will go to Fort Conger, and thence begin his journey to the Pole, either by the Greenland coast or from Cape Hella, as conditions may determine.

A New Attitude.

CITY OF MEXICO, September 15.—Something of a sensation has been caused by the new attitude of the Catholic clergy regarding civil marriage, which alone legalizes marriage here. Formerly the clergy refused to recognize civil marriage, but are now urging women to be careful to secure the religious ceremony, as many men, taking advantage of the fact that the religious ceremony is not recognized in law, marry and then desert their wives.

Canada and the World's Exposition.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The Paris Exhibition commissioners met to consider a number of applications for space. The time for applying for space expired on June 30, yet applications are still coming in at the rate of about twenty-five a day. The allotment of space was proceeded with, and sketches thereof will be sent to intending exhibitors right away. The commission has been apprised that 4,000 extra feet of space has been awarded to Canada, making 45,000 altogether, which will enable the commissioners to provide for applications received.

Archbishop Ireland's Opinion.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept 15.—Archbishop Ireland, asked for his opinion on the meeting to protest against the verdict of the Rennes court martial, said:—"It is my belief that public meetings in America such as it is proposed to hold for the purpose of protesting against the sentence of the Rennes court martial are untimely, unfair to France, and likely to breed regrettable ill feeling between that country and our own. I shall not deny that I have always had in my heart deep sympathy for the unfortunate officer who has been under trial in Rennes, and that I had wished and hoped that the sentence of the court would have been one of acquittal. But it is another question to face the verdict of the court, the moment that verdict has been declared, with the assertion that it is plainly against truth, and that the court from which it issues is guilty of base injustice and sacrilegious perjury. And it is still more so another question to lay on France the crime of the verdict, if crime there be in it, and throw at a whole people and their Government insulting epithets. Let us wait. This whole matter belongs to the internal life and to the internal administration of France, and international courtesy as well as justice bid us talk about it very carefully and very slowly. France is a proud, sensitive nation. She will deeply resent, as it is her right, undue criticism and hasty judgement of her acts by a foreign people, and especially will she resent, as it is surely her right, any uncalculated interference with her internal administration, and any imprudent challenging of her national honour."

Vanderbilts Great Wealth.

NEW YORK, Sept 15.—While it is generally known that Mr. Vanderbilt was an enormously rich man, yet little is known of his actual fortune. He was a most reticent man about his private affairs. His fortune has been variously estimated at all the way from \$80,000,000 to \$200,000,000. It was mostly in railroad stock, bonds, and securities. He was not interested to any great extent in any of the new industrial companies that have been formed, and in fact had no holdings of moment in any corporations aside from railroads. He was comparatively not a large real estate owner.

One who was close in the confidence of Mr. Vanderbilt said it would be folly for anyone to try to make a correct valuation of the estate, but that it might be roughly estimated from \$125,000,000 to \$140,000,000; even this was sheer surmise. Mr. Vanderbilt's holdings were not speculative in any sense of the word, and so his death had no perceptible effect on Wall street. When he suffered the first stroke of paralysis, his affairs were placed in such shape that if he should die the fortune would be intact and no confusion result.

The Bubonic Plague.

MOSCOW, Sept 15.—Prince Oldenburg, who is supervising the Government's efforts to insulate and stamp out the bubonic plague in Southern Russia in Europe, reports that eight cases—four of them fatal—have appeared at Samara, capital of the Government of the same name.

Schley Sent South.

THE SITUATION IN TRANSVAAL.

Warlike Rumors, Peaceful Measures.

THE TRANSVAAL TO BE FORCED TO DISARM.

Should President Continue Obdurate.

JOHANNESBURG, Sept 16.—The Eastern Star, of Johannesburg, asserts that a martial law proclamation is being printed; and it is reported here that the reply of the Transvaal government to the British note will suggest a seven years franchise.

LONDON, Sept 16.—In the forecast of Kruger's reply, there is undoubtedly a large basis of truth which seems to bring the dispute within measurable distance of war.

This evening the press association issued a curious statement to the effect that as soon as the garrison of Natal had been sufficiently strengthened the Transvaal Government would be called upon to complete a new convention already drafted which, while guaranteeing the integrity of the Transvaal State, provides for the demolition of the forts and limits the armed force of the Transvaal to a number deemed sufficient to maintain internal order.

According to the press association, the convention will demand the diplomatic agencies be suppressed and the judiciary be made independent of the executive.

This sentiment which realizes extreme demands of Uitlanders must be accepted under reserve at the present stage, but it is not unlikely to be a semi-official hint as to the next move of the Government should President Kruger prove obdurate.

JOHN MORLEY'S PROPHECY.

Britain Will Repent War With the Boers.

MANCHESTER, September 16.—Right Hon. John Morley, the Liberal member of Parliament, while addressing a peace meeting here last evening, was frequently interrupted by cries of "Mahjuba Hill" and other anti-Boer demonstrations.

In retorting to interruptions, Mr. Morley said: "A year or two ago the United States saw only one aspect of war; and what are they doing today? They are repenting. They have their yellow press, and we have our yellow press. If I am asked to speak in this hall a year or two later I shall find those who now oppose me repenting also."
