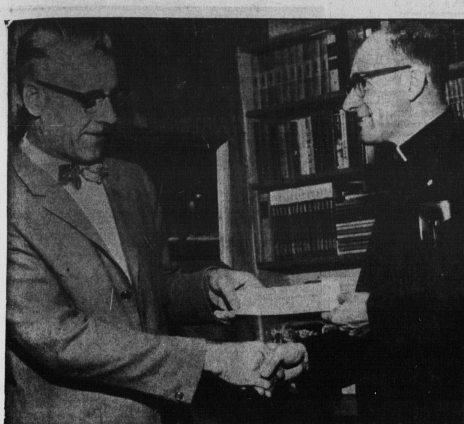
The Radical supporting party decided to withdraw from the coalition with the Social Democrats after being reduced in strength in two successive general elections.

**SEATS UNCHANGED**

The Social Democratic Party, which had 11 years of unbroken power, emerged with an unchanged 76 seats of the total of 175.

The premier informed the king he was prepared to head a new government.

Observers said a Social Democratic minority government seemed the most probable result of the election.
