

# Donnie MacLean Pitches No-Hit Game

## Rogers Hornsby Fired As Browns Manager; Marty Marion New Pilot

BOSTON, June 10 (AP)—Outspoken Rogers Hornsby today was fired as manager of St. Louis Browns by Bill Veck, club president who named Marty Marion as the team's new pilot.

"I blew one," Veck said in a huddle with baseball writers after making the change. "I shouldn't have signed him (Hornsby) in the first place. I had the change in mind for some time."

He contended Hornsby, one of baseball's all time greats was "unreasonable" in dealing with players.

He doesn't consider them as individuals, only as players something to be manipulated.

"No one is going to tell me how to run a ball club," said Hornsby. "I'm not going to go for any of his screwy ideas."

"I'm really surprised," said Marion, who was fired after managing

the rival St. Louis Cardinals last season. "One reason I went with the Browns was because no one could say I was after the manager's job, not with an experienced fellow like Hornsby as manager."

Hornsby has a three-year contract which will be paid in full over an unspecified period.

Marion was signed for three years—to finish out this season as playing manager and for two additional years as bench manager.

### Parting Of The Ways

Hornsby contended he and Veck came to the parting of the ways after an incident in New York last Sunday.

Veck said: "No that was just another incident, something to hang a hat on."

Hornsby said Veck called from St. Louis Sunday ordering him to protest an umpire's decision.

"No one is going to tell me how to run a ball club on the field," said the Rajah.

"I carried out his orders and the umpire reminded me, as I knew, that a protest in the American League must be registered before the next pitch is thrown."

"I think I did a good job. The boys played well for me. We got off to a good start and had the crowd with us in St. Louis and that's what Bill wanted. I'm not sore at anybody."

Said Veck, "It's better to have 25 players and no manager than just a manager. Baseball is a team game. Things must be amicable and they weren't."

Hornsby took over the Browns this season after piloting Seattle to the Pacific Coast League championship last year.

He was signed as the man who would lead the down-trodden Browns out of the American League cellar where they had been virtually permanent residents.

The club took off with a rush, leading the league for a while. However, lacking batting power, the team began to slip and now is in seventh place, even though only 7 1-2 games off the top.

A master with the bat, Hornsby, led the National League six seasons and his 424 average in 1924 while with the Cardinals is a modern record.

MacLean thanked a good breaking hook for his no-hitter. "My hook was breaking pretty good over the outside corner," stated "Funnell" after the game when we asked him about his most effective pitch. He stated that he started to feel good during the third inning and from then on he felt in perfect condition. In the third inning, it will be recalled by those who saw the game, that he struck out three men, the only three who faced him.

Umpire Leo Doyle did not know that MacLean hurled a no-hitter until several minutes after the completion of the game. Meeting Leo coming out of the club house we asked him how it felt to work a no-hitter. The surprised look that flashed across his face when we told him that MacLean had pitched such a game is something that we will not soon forget. "I didn't have the slightest idea that he was even close to one," replied the umpire. Base judges Jack Kane and Cecil Ward stated they knew MacLean had a no-hitter.

Although coach Ev. MacNeill did not predict a no-hitter he came close on Tuesday night when he stated that MacLean would log the ball past a lot of M.C.A. batters yesterday evening. On the strength of MacLean's pitching he was quoting the odds as pre-game favorites by odds of 2-1. This is the second time on the eve of a junior game this season that Ev has come up with some pretty accurate observations. The last time, a week ago, he stated it was a big question about whom he could get to play first base the following day. He then solved the matter by playing himself.

And in talking about the pitching in yesterday's game we must not forget that there was a fellow by the name of MacAlear on the mound for M.C.A. who did a great job. "Lefty" was very tough in the tight spots. Every time when the Abbies got into scoring position "Lefty" bore down to strike out the batter or made them hit into a force play. In "Lefty's" favor was the fact that eight of the Abbie batters were lefthanded hitters. MacAlear struck out six men, all of them while there were Abbies on the bases.

As far as MacLean should be concerned the game was a no-hit, no-run achievement for him. The only run scored against him, which came in the first inning, was unearned. It was scored by two men out and after he had fanned the third man to end the inning. The catcher, however, dropped the ball, and on the low throw to first the ball was bobbled enabling Lorne Hennessey to score with M.C.A.'s only run.

Seven of the Maritime Central Airways players were victims of MacLean's fast ball and hook and went back to the dugout via the strikeout route. Glen Matheson, Kenny Wilson and Arnold MacCallum were struck out three times each. Lorne Hennessey, Elmer MacNeill and Lefty MacAlear were twice victimized and Freddy Keillor once. Irving MacKinnon and Des Trainor escaped the whip. The best bid for a hit was Freddy Keillor's hot grounder to lead-off the eighth inning. "Duck" MacLeod made a beautiful play on the ball and nipped Keillor at first.

We can truthfully say that the game was the easiest we ever had the opportunity of scoring. There was absolutely nothing con-

## Turpin Stops Cockell In 11 Bruising Rounds

LONDON, June 10 (AP)—Randy Turpin stopped Don Cockell in 11 bruising rounds tonight and added the British and Empire light heavyweight title to his British and European middleweight crowns.

The end came at 1:10 of the 11th when referee Tommy Little grabbed Turpin's arms as Cockell sank dazed on the ropes.

The former world middleweight champion, who was giving away almost 12 pounds had lashed Cockell with a terrific left and right six and had followed with two more tremendous punches to the head that sent the heavier man sprawling for a count of nine.

A stinging Turpin left hook sent Cockell reeling half way across the ring and on to the ropes just before the fight ended.

Turpin, who weighed 162 1/2 pounds to Cockell's 174 3/4, was far ahead on points when the end came. He floored Cockell for a count of eight with his deadly left and right combination to the head in the third. He had won eight of the previous 10 rounds on the associated Press scorecard. Cockell won the sixth, in which he pummeled Turpin with rights and lefts to the body, and the 10th was even.

The British Boxing Board of Control declared Turpin will have several weeks to decide which of his British titles he will keep. British rules forbid him to hold both.

## Hooks Up With MacAlear In Hurling Duel; Abbies MCA Play To 1-1 Draw

Donnie "Funnell" MacLean hurled a brilliant no-hitter yesterday evening at Memorial Field as he hooked up in a thrilling pitching duel with veteran "Lefty" MacAlear in a nine inning game which ended in a 1-1 draw between the Junior Abbies and M.C.A.

The willowy rig-thunder using a fast ball and a beautifully breaking hook fanned 16 batters in pitching the first no-hitter in the Province since an R. C. A. His outfielders were not called upon to make a solitary play as the rival batters did not hit a ball out of the infield. He was charged with two wild pitches one of which figured in the scoring of the always runs.

In three separate innings he sent three batters down swinging. Three men were victims of his hooks in the first, third and sixth frames. Only in the second and ninth innings did he fail to strikeout a man.

Kenny Wilson, Glen Matheson, Elmer MacNeill and Irving MacEminon were the last batters to face the go-hit author. Wilson flied to second, Matheson grounded out third to first, MacNeill walked and MacKinnon flied to first to end the M. C. A. half of the ninth.

MacLean had to be brilliant as his older opponent on the M. C. A. mound, "Lefty" MacAlear showed too much stuff for the Abegweit batsmen. MacAlear surrendered only five hits, four of them singles and turned in great pitching in the clutches.
