The Spanish Magna Charta. MADRID, July 7. A Bill has been introduced into the Spanish Cortes most sweeping in its reform tendency. It provides for the better protection of personal rights, the sanctity of the domicile, and further religious tolerance.

The Irish Bishops Protest. DUBLIN, July 7. The Irish Bishops have, almost unanimously, issued a protest against State-aid immigration. They declare that in Ireland there is now sufficient land which, if it were allowed to be cultivated for the Irish people, exclusively, would support all the surplus population.
