WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Interesting Particulars of the Struggle Between Great Britain and the Boers.

RIMINGTON NOT DISBANDED.

The story, to which the World first gave publicity, that Lord Methuen had disbanded Rimington's Guides because their loyalty was under suspicion is effectually disproved by the following letter sent by direction of Lord Roberts to the editor of the Port Elizabeth Advertiser:—

It has been brought to the knowledge of the field marshal commander-in-chief that on Jan. 6, a report appeared in the Port Elizabeth Advertiser reflecting on the loyalty of the colonial scouts employed under Major M. F. Rimington with the force commanded by Lieutenant-General Lord Methuen.

I am directed to inform you, as the result of enquiry, that the charge is absolutely without foundation, and that Lord Methuen speaks in the highest terms of the fidelity and good work of the brave men whose honor has been thus wantonly traduced. I am, sir,

Commandant Grobelaar, of the Boer forces, was discovered at a farm near Donkerspoort wounded, is one of the most interesting of the Boer leaders—a man of 40, tall and powerfully built, with regular features, a brown beard, curling moustache, and piercing eyes. He is a magnificent figure on horseback, and speaks English fluently. He is well read on modern history, and has always taken a great interest in current events and travelled extensively in America. Though he fought bravely from the first, he always declared the war was cruel and unjust.

AN EXPLANATION.

The continued lack of aggressive movement on the part of the British is best explained in a despatch from Bloemfontein, dated Sunday March 25, and published in the Times. It says:

"The condition existing in the occupied territory rendered imperative a somewhat prolonged halt at Bloemfontein. It is necessary that the effect of the proclamation should have time to make itself felt. It is declared that danger of annoyance to the line of communication may be apprehended. The territory behind the advancing forces is rendered absolutely secure. The accuracy of this view is proved by the fact of the enemy breaking up into isolated groups, such as that which attacked the guards' officers Friday. The adjustment of financial and municipal matters in the Free State is now chiefly occupying the attention of the governor and his legal and financial advisors. The military regime is being conducted with great smoothness, but recent investigations show that caution must be exercised in dealing with persons apparently loyal."

This summary from headquarters is probably an accurate explanation of the frequent appearance and disappearance of Boers and insurgents upon which the reports are so conflicting and which so puzzles military critics.

Among the most interesting cases in the Canadian hospital is that of Lance-Corporal Octampart, of Montreal. During the operations at Paardeburg he became sick while marching with a brigade, and fell out and lost consciousness. When he recovered his senses he found himself alone, and was soon taken prisoner by three Boers. They took his shoes and coat from him, and he was guarded by one or other of them all day. But he

managed to escape early next morning. He eluded their search and wandered for three days. At last he saw the lights of Kimberley and literally crawled into the town, having hurt his back by falling into a hole. He had been three days and a half without food or water, and had travelled forty-five miles without shoes. He bound his puttees round his feet. When he asked the Boers for water they replied they had not enough themselves. He is recovering, and with rest and the attention he is receiving in the Canadian Red Cross Hospital, he will soon be fit for service.

The correspondent of the London Morning Post at Osofontein, referring to the encouragement given to the Boers by the Peace party in England, says that "the effect is already perceptible in its strengthening of the enemy's determination to continue the struggle in the hope of a defeat of the Conservative Government." As a matter of fact, messages have already been sent out to the Boers by people prominently associated with the "Stop the War" and South Africa Conciliation Committees, urging the Boers to fight on, and to "give England a staggering blow." The rising of the Cape Dutch is, of course, the direct result of the work of the agents of the Committees.

The Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, writing to the City Clerk of Ottawa from Clondeboye, Ireland, thanks the corporation of Ottawa for its resolution of condolence on the death of his son, the late Earl of Ava. He says: I ask you to convey to the Mayor and members of the municipality, in my own name and that of Lady Dufferin, the expression of our deepest gratitude for this signal mark of their sympathy with us in the death of our eldest son. Recalling, as we do, the many happy years passed in Ottawa, and the constant kindnesses and consideration shown to us by its inhabitants, it is soothing to our feelings that they should still remember us and have thought of us in our sorrow. The action of the municipality in displaying the national ensign at half mast for a week was a tribute to our son's memory that has touched us to the heart.

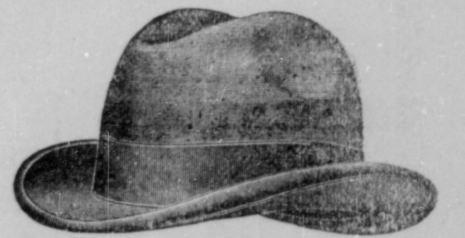

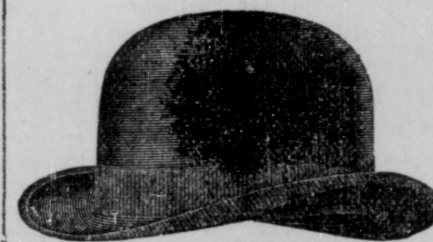

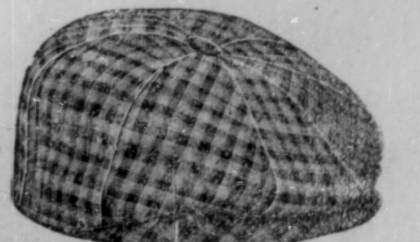
