Anglicans Agree To Push Offensive On Materialism

TORONTO (CP)—The problem the Anglicans posed themselves as they assembled in world congress here two weeks ago was how to challenge a world that seems to care less and less about what the church in general and Anglicans in particular stand for.

They decided immediately against a policy of containment and adopted instead a strategy of roll-back.

"I do not send all His time in church," said the congress chairman, Canadian Primate Howard H. Clark, at the opening rally. "The church that lives to itself will die by itself," warned Anglicanism's senior primate, the Archbishop of Canterbury.

But just how to take the offensive both on a global basis—in the field of missions—and at the local level, against an increasing materialism, provoked much of the debate during the 11-day congress, which ended Friday.

TAKE PLANES BACK

ACCRA (AP)—Ghana has persuaded the Soviet Union to take back four of its Ilushin-18 planes bought on credit for \$1,876,000 each, says the minister of communications and works, E. K. Bensaah.

The planes were purchased on a Soviet credit of \$42,000,000 granted Ghana in 1960. Bensaah said the planes, originally ordered for the Ghana Air force, became surplus and were not needed by the Ghana Airways Corporation.
