THE GUARDIAN AGAIN.

YESTERDAY THE EXAMINER pointed out that it had not observed in the Guardian a word of commendation of the course pursued by the Opposition members regarding prohibition. The Guardian takes exception to this statement, and by way of refutation extracts from its issue of yesterday the following:—

"In the Legislature the representatives of the Conservative party comprising almost half the House, gave their support to the principle of the Bill. They went much further, in proposing and supporting by their votes amendments designed to make it more stringent and effective."

LIBERAL SCANDALS.

It is announced from Ottawa that the Government has flatly refused to entertain, all and singular, the suggestions made by Sir Charles Tupper a week ago with the object of enlarging the scope of the election frauds commission and facilitating its proceedings and conclusions. At the time Sir Wilfrid Laurier promised to lay these suggestions before the Minister of Justice, and subsequently he read Mr. Mills' decision declining them all. Sir Wilfrid and his associates are evidently not strong on investigations. For ways that are dark they are not unlike the heathen Chinese. But their sins are finding them out.

There is not room for two opinions regarding the emergency rations scandal, and the action of the Premier in preventing prompt enquiry is therefore surprising. We agree with the Mail and Empire that on such a serious matter, a matter involving the lives of our brave fellows at the front, the Government ought to be only too glad to order an investigation. As a matter of fact the affair should have been probed without Parliamentary intervention at all. It ought not to have been necessary for Mr. Monk to raise the question in the House. There was nothing to consider, nothing to make postponement necessary.

But the Liberal scandals do not end with election frauds and emergency rations. Everything they touch seems tainted. The latest is a charge of fraud in connection with the Yukon telegraph scheme. In his place in the House a few days ago Sir Hibbert Tupper called for papers in connection with the purchases for this undertaking. At once Sir

Wilfrid said a regular notice of motion would have to be given before the papers would be produced. This was a "bluff," for the Government has taken every day for its own business, and a notice of motion cannot be reached this session. Sir Hibbert intimated that no supplies will be voted until the papers and accounts are produced. The Yukon telegraph job, which is in Tarte's department, requires investigation on behalf of the people.

PINEAU would appear to be in doubt whether he was in Ottawa or not in March last. Perhaps, if he would ask Donald Bernard McLellan, M. P., his doubts could be removed.

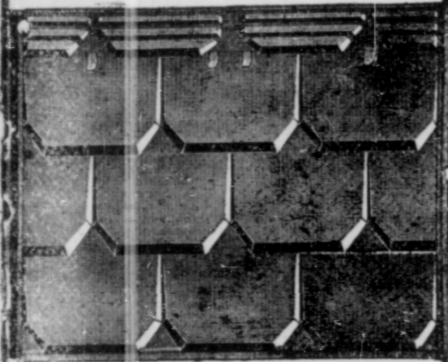
